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- 2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Will the members
- 3 of the Public Safety Committee please take
- 4 their seats? I'm going to call the Public
- 5 Safety Committee to order. I will be the
- 6 clerk and take attendance first. Legislator
- 7 Wink?
- 8 LEGISLATOR WINK: Here.
- 9 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Dave
- 10 Denenberg?
- 11 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Here.
- 12 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Ranking Member
- 13 Legislator Joe Scannell?
- 14 LEGISLATOR SCANNELL: Here.
- 15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator
- 16 Michael Venditto?
- 17 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: Here.
- 18 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator
- 19 Denise Ford?
- LEGISLATOR FORD: Here.
- 21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Vice Chairman
- Joe Belesi?
- LEGISLATOR BELESI: Here.
- 24 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: And chairman,
- 25 Dennis Dunne, I'm here. We have a quorum.

- 2 The first item on today's calendar is Item
- 3 672-12, an ordinance supplemental to the
- 4 annual appropriation ordinance in connection
- 5 with the Office of the Medical Examiner's
- 6 Office. Is there someone from the Medical
- 7 Examiner's Office here?
- 8 MR. MAY: Yes. Mr. Joe Avella.
- 9 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Joe, tell us
- 10 what this is for.
- 11 MR. AVELLA: This is a grant
- 12 administered by DCGS, New York State DCGS,
- 13 and it's used to support the ongoing
- 14 operations of the DNA lab.
- 15 LEGISLATOR BELESI: So moved.
- 16 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.
- 17 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 18 Legislator Belesi, seconded by Denise Ford.
- Now, any legislators have any
- 20 questions on this?
- 21 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: I had a
- 22 question.
- 23 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Dave
- 24 Denenberg.
- 25 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Now,

- 2 what's the amount? Is this \$22,000?
- MR. AVELLA: \$22,000, correct.
- 4 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: This money
- 5 is coming from where?
- 6 MR. AVELLA: This is a grant that
- 7 is I believe originated as the Paul
- 8 CoverDell Grant. It's a federal grant that
- 9 is administered by New York State Department
- 10 of Criminal Justice Services.
- 11 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: We still
- 12 qualify for this grant even though the
- 13 medical examiner's office -- I thought that
- 14 we haven't been operating. I thought we
- 15 were going up to -- isn't this the forensic
- 16 lab?
- 17 MR. AVELLA: There are several
- 18 forensic labs that are still in operation
- 19 and have always been, so there was no change
- 20 in service. This is one of those
- 21 laboratories.
- 22 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: How is
- 23 this different than --
- MR. AVELLA: This particular one
- 25 is the department of forensic genetics.

- 2 That department was unaffected. There were
- 3 no changes.
- 4 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So this
- 5 has nothing to do with the police lab?
- MR. AVELLA: Correct.
- 7 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any legislators
- 10 have any other questions?
- 11 (No verbal response.)
- 12 Is there any public comment?
- 13 (No verbal response.)
- 14 There being none, all those in
- 15 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 16 (Aye.)
- 17 Any against?
- 18 (No verbal response.)
- 19 So passed. The next committee is
- 20 finance with that.
- 21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: The next item is
- 22 Item 702-12, an ordinance supplemental to
- 23 the annual appropriations ordinance in
- 24 connection with the Police Department. We
- 25 also have 704-12 with the police, 705-12 for

- 2 the police. You can take all three at this
- 3 time. Motion for all three items.
- 4 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.
- 5 LEGISLATOR BELESI: Second.
- 6 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 7 Legislator Ford, seconded by Legislator
- 8 Denise Belesi. We'll take 702 first and
- 9 then we'll go to 704 and 705.
- 10 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Good
- 11 afternoon. Sergeant Greg Stephanoff again.
- 12 Item 702 is a grant from the New York State
- 13 Department of Criminal Justice for \$50,000.
- 14 This money is going to be used to focus on
- 15 under 21 drinking nightclub problem, in
- 16 nightclubs, nightclub situations. It's also
- 17 going to be used to buy some equipment,
- 18 license plate reader, window tint readers,
- 19 just to help the officers with their
- 20 enforcement.
- 21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Is there a
- 22 window tint reader, what is --
- 23 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Window tint
- 24 readers measure to make sure that the
- 25 tinting is legal on the cars.

- 2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That's pretty
- 3 cool. I never knew they had that before.
- 4 On 702 we have a question on 702.
- 5 Legislator Ford.
- 6 LEGISLATOR FORD: Also, thank you
- 7 very much because I know that you did some
- 8 stings during the past couple of weeks and
- 9 found some places selling to underage
- 10 drinkers. So I appreciate the efforts, with
- 11 everything else that's going on.
- But with this equipment here, I
- 13 know with the nightclub and the drinking
- 14 establishments, does any of this cover,
- 15 like, the noise measurement meters that you
- 16 may have, or would that be under something
- 17 else?
- 18 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: I think the
- 19 noise level is -- I think that's when you
- 20 bring in the fire marshal in the town, they
- 21 would have inspectors.
- 22 LEGISLATOR FORD: Okay. So that
- 23 would be the actual local zoning
- 24 jurisdiction rather than the police?
- 25 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: I believe

- 2 so, yes.
- 3 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
- 4 much.
- 5 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: 720, any other
- 6 legislator? Legislator Denenberg.
- 7 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: With
- 8 respect to what Legislator Ford just said,
- 9 each town would have an ordinance on noise
- 10 level, but they often, in the village of
- 11 Freeport, the Freeport Police ends up
- 12 enforcing and they have decimeters.
- I don't know that any town code
- 14 people -- I think Town of Hempstead has all
- 15 of six people to enforce noise violations.
- 16 I know throughout my district that if it's
- 17 the summer and people are complaining about
- 18 a party, or their they're complaining that a
- 19 business is breaking the noise code, the
- 20 only people that are going to be responding
- 21 is the Nassau County Police. They're the
- 22 only ones who would have a squad car in the
- 23 area if there's a party on a Friday or
- 24 Saturday night. And they're the only ones
- 25 that are going to be around 10, 11:00 in a

- 2 business area. So how would we -- I mean
- 3 Nassau police can enforce town code, such as
- 4 the noise level --
- 5 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Without
- 6 using I guess a piece of equipment, if you
- 7 hear it for a certain amount of blocks, you
- 8 can also enforce it as well. I don't think
- 9 you always have to get piece of equipment
- 10 out for the decibel readings.
- 11 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So we
- 12 don't have a decimeter or something that
- 13 measures the decibel levels?
- 14 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Not that
- 15 I'm aware of. I can find out, but not that
- 16 I'm aware of.
- 17 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: I'm just
- 18 wondering, I mean, I think that the police
- 19 do a very good job in those quality of life
- 20 type issues, but without -- I mean, how do
- 21 you judge whether someone's breaking a code
- 22 that says, I believe it's 30 decibels is the
- 23 code in the Town of Hempstead, as well as
- 24 the Village of Freeport. No one has an ear
- 25 that can measure 30 decibels.

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- So, I mean, how do we enforce
- 3 that code as the police department who is
- 4 always going to be the ones responding to
- 5 the 911 call on a weekend or at night?
- 6 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: I can find
- 7 that out. Offhand, I'm not sure.
- 8 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any other
- 9 legislators have any questions on this?
- 10 (No verbal response.)
- Is there any public comment?
- 12 (No verbal response.)
- There being none, all those in
- 14 favor of 702-12 indicate by saying aye.
- 15 (Aye.)
- 16 Any against?
- 17 (No verbal response.)
- 18 Any abstentions?
- 19 (No verbal response.)
- Item passes and goes on to
- 21 finance. 704 and 705 are both ordinances
- 22 supplemental to the annual appropriation
- 23 ordinance in connection with the police
- 24 department. So we'll do 704 right now.
- 25 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Item 704 is

- 2 a Homeland Security Grant for \$386,500.
- 3 This is used to combat terrorism, for
- 4 exercises and drills as well as classroom
- 5 training and office, some equipment
- 6 purchases too.
- 7 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions
- 8 from any of the legislators?
- 9 (No verbal response.)
- 10 Is there any public comment?
- 11 (No verbal response.)
- 12 There being none, all those in
- 13 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 14 (Aye.)
- 15 Any against?
- 16 (No verbal response.)
- 17 Any abstentions?
- 18 (No verbal response.)
- 19 There being none, it passes and
- 20 moves on to finance.
- 21 705 now.
- 22 SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: 705 is a
- 23 grant also from New York State Homeland
- 24 Security. This will provide 55,023 for
- 25 extra enforcement on our waterways to combat

- 2 terrorism also.
- 3 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any legislators
- 4 have any questions?
- 5 (No verbal response.)
- Is there any public comment?
- 7 (No verbal response.)
- 8 There being none, all those in
- 9 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 10 (Aye.)
- 11 Any against?
- 12 (No verbal response.)
- Any abstentions?
- 14 (No verbal response.)
- 15 There being none -- I would like
- 16 you to stay here because you're involved in
- 17 one of the other ones, 709. We're going to
- 18 call 709-12. Item 709-12, an ordinance
- 19 supplemental to the annual appropriations
- 20 ordinance in connection with the Health
- 21 Department, Police Department, Office of
- 22 Emergency Management and Fire Commission.
- 23 MR. MAY: Mr. Chairman, if we can
- 24 also call Clerk Item 703, these are actually
- 25 being primarily handled by the Office of

- 2 Emergency Management. We have Mr. Tom
- 3 Delaney here to answer any questions on this
- 4 item. Obviously Sergeant Stephanoff can
- 5 stay here if there are any questions on his
- 6 part. But this is an OEM lead item.
- 7 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Ordinance
- 8 703-12 is an ordinance supplemental to the
- 9 annual appropriation ordinance in connection
- 10 with the police department, office of
- 11 medical examiner, the office of emergency
- 12 management and the corrections department.
- Now, motion on these two items.
- 14 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.
- 15 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: Second.
- 16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 17 Legislator Ford, seconded by our newest
- 18 legislator, Mr. Venditto. What do we have
- 19 on this?
- MR. DELANEY: Tom Delaney, Office
- 21 of Emergency Management. These are the
- 22 Homeland Security Grants, Uwasi and SHSP
- 23 that we've been receiving every year from
- 24 New York State. These are actual federal
- 25 grants, passed through New York State.

- The intent of these grants is to
- 3 help build our capabilities and strengthen
- 4 against terrorism. The monies are divided
- 5 amongst several departments, as you've
- 6 listed, or as you named them before in this.
- 7 We put a request to these
- 8 departments about what their needs are so we
- 9 can build these capabilities and then we
- 10 appropriate funds as to try to build these,
- 11 again, capabilities.
- 12 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: So what's the
- difference between 703 and 709, there's a
- 14 couple of different departments involved in.
- MR. DELANEY: Well, one of them
- 16 is the SHSP Grant. That's the 703. The 709
- 17 is the Uwasi Grant. SHSP is State Homeland
- 18 Security Program. Uwasi is the urban area
- 19 security initiative.
- We get the SHSP because we're
- 21 part of New York State. We get the Uwasi
- 22 because we're in the New York City urban
- 23 area security group.
- 24 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Now you said we
- 25 get the shift, F-T, right?

8	Legislator Venditto, seconded by Legislator
9	Belesi.

23	finance. We can now go to item 712. 712 is
24	an ordinance supplemental to the annual
25	appropriations ordinance in connection with

- 2 the Correctional Center.
- 3 LEGISLATOR BELESI: So moved.
- 4 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: Second.
- 5 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 6 Legislator Belesi, seconded by Legislator
- 7 Venditto. Who is here to speak on the
- 8 correction officers?
- 9 MR. MAY: We have me today, Mr.
- 10 Chairman. Captain Keith Sather regrets to
- 11 say that he couldn't come today. He is
- 12 having surgery today.
- CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Do you know what
- 14 it's about?
- 15 MR. MAY: Absolutely. This is
- 16 the federal forfeiture funds that we receive
- 17 from the federal drug enforcement agency.
- 18 These funds cannot be used replace county
- 19 founds in any of our programs. They can
- 20 only be used to supplement our funds.
- 21 Specifically, these funds will be
- 22 used to purchase uniforms, and equipment,
- 23 and training, and in this case, SERT is not
- 24 C-E-R-T, it's not civilian emergency
- 25 response team, it's the sheriff's emergency

- 2 response team, S-E-R-T.
- 3 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. Any
- 4 legislators have any questions?
- 5 (No verbal response.)
- Is there any public comment?
- 7 (No verbal response.)
- 8 There being none, all those in
- 9 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 10 (Aye.)
- 11 Any against?
- 12 (No verbal response.)
- Any abstentions?

- There being none, it passes. It
- 16 goes on to finance. Next is Item 713-12, an
- 17 ordinance supplemental to the annual
- 18 appropriations ordinance in connection with
- 19 the Department of Probation. Do we have
- 20 someone from probation?
- MR. MAY: We have Mr. Ed Shank
- 22 here from probation. Mr. Shank.
- 23 MR. SHANK: Good afternoon. Ed
- 24 Shank. 713 is for \$18,891. It's a grant
- 25 from the New York State Division of Criminal

- 2 Justice Services. It's for a program that
- 3 provides pretrial release and bail reports
- 4 to the court, post arraignment, including
- 5 recommendations on release status and
- 6 community based treatment plans and
- 7 supervision. This is extensive to June
- 8 30th, 2013.
- 9 This grant had been a previous
- 10 calendar year grant and the state this year
- 11 changed the funding period through July 1st
- 12 to June 30th. So this is for the additional
- 13 six months beginning January 1 and we'll
- 14 pick up again next July for which there will
- 15 be a separate supplement.
- 16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent.
- 17 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: So moved.
- 18 LEGISLATOR BELESI: Second.
- 19 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 20 Legislator Venditto, seconded by Legislator
- 21 Belesi. Any legislators have any questions
- 22 on this item?
- 23 (No verbal response.)
- Is there any public comment?
- 25 (No verbal response.)

- There being none, all those in
- 3 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 4 (Aye.)
- 5 Any against?
- 6 (No verbal response.)
- 7 Any abstentions?
- 8 (No verbal response.0
- 9 This now passes onto finance. We
- 10 now have an addendum. The addendum is -- we
- 11 need a motion to suspend the rules so we can
- 12 do the addendum.
- 13 LEGISLATOR BELESI: So moved.
- 14 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: Second.
- 15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 16 Legislator Belesi, seconded by Legislator
- 17 Venditto. On the addendum, it's 715-12, an
- 18 ordinance supplemental to the annual
- 19 appropriations ordinance in connection with
- 20 the Department of Probation once again.
- 21 What is this about?
- MR. SHANK: Edward Shank, Nassau
- 23 County Probation. This has two different
- 24 grants on it. The first two items were
- 25 \$125,345 and \$13,887 are part of our

- 2 Alternatives to Incarceration Grant from the
- 3 New York State Division of Criminal Justice
- 4 Services.
- 5 The first item for \$125,000
- 6 includes pretrial screenings and interviews
- 7 for the determination of release for low
- 8 risk offenders. The \$13,887 is for
- 9 community service cases that are a part of
- 10 the sentence.
- 11 Again, this is extended through
- 12 June 30, 2013. This was also part of the
- 13 same grant that I previously spoke about.
- 14 The last item for \$275,000 is for
- 15 the traffic safety. This is DWI money, and
- 16 it's to support community supervision of
- 17 approximately 3,000 offenders on probation
- 18 in Nassau for drunk driving.
- 19 In addition to paying the salary
- 20 of one of our 16 DWI probation officers, the
- 21 funding is used to underwrite off hour field
- 22 operations.
- 23 As of October 31st, 2012, the
- 24 probation department has made 2,748
- 25 unannounced visits to homes of drunk

- 2 drivers. The goal is to help those
- 3 probations working with us to improve
- 4 themselves to succeed and to identify and to
- 5 hold fully accountable those probations who
- 6 do not.
- 7 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We want you to
- 8 keep up the good work. Motion?
- 9 LEGISLATOR VENDITTO: So moved.
- 10 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.
- 11 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We have a motion
- on Item 715-12 by Legislator Venditto,
- 13 seconded by Legislator Ford. Any
- 14 legislators have any questions?
- 15 (No verbal response.)
- 16 Is there any public comment?
- 17 (No verbal response.)
- There being none, all those in
- 19 favor indicate by saying aye.
- 20 (Aye.)
- 21 Any against?
