MR. SHANK: Good afternoon. My name's Edward Shank. I'm the counsel to the Nassau County Probation Department. Probation Director Fowle has asked me to share the following with you with regard to Item 543-12.

It's an appropriation of \$142,800 from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services funding to support probation's role in Operation Impact.

The Nassau County Police Department and District Attorney's Office are the lead Impact partners with 2012/13 DEC JS support totaling \$971,400 locally.

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The primary goal is the reduction of violent crime and, in particular, gun violence.

Impact funds support probation's field intelligence officer who is embedded at NCPD's lead development center, and attends Nassau NSTAT crime analyst and Impact meetings.

Routinely sharing information with our Impact partners, the FIO's daily activities including NCPD arrest reports and field interviews with the probation database and sharing debriefing intelligence on probationers who test positive for drugs. Operation Impact also continues to fund Operation Night Watch. Conducted primarily with the NCPD, Night Watch partners also include the Glen Cove and Long Beach City, Hempstead, Freeport, Port Washington, and other village police departments. Teams of probation and police officers conduct off hours on announced searches of the homes of high risk probationers. These are individuals who have sustained arrests, have tested positive for cocaine, opiates, or prescription drugs, are gang members, robbers, burglars, or have been the subject of noteworthy field interviews or are

otherwise significantly non-compliant with their probation conditions.

From July 2008 through December 2011,
Night Watch teams conducted 2,457 homes visits,
leading to 1,453 searches to ensure offender
compliance with probation conditions. These
searches, in addition to warrant sweeps,
supported by Impact have, since July 2008, led to
174 probationer arrests, including 10 firearms
and related charges and 35 other weapons charges.
Through the first eight months of 2012, Night
Watch teams have visited 354 high risk probations
and made an additional 21 arrests.

For the second consecutive year, Impact supports probation's Night Light initiative focusing on juvenile delinquents who are truant. Night Light recognizes the connection between truancy, substance abuse, and delinquency. So far, in 2012, 141 juveniles have been visited off hours. Probation, working with other Impact stakeholders, to enhance our ability to collect and share information and using that information to inform resource allocation decisions to further reduce crime in Nassau County.

We did an ordinance in 11 for the buses. I can give you what number ordinance that was. It was Ordinance 81-2011 for \$3.1 million. The department is putting together the 12 plan, and that will be submitted this week, which will cover that difference in budget that was brought up as part of the bond ordinance --

CHAIRMAN NICOLELLO: Legislator Denenberg.

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So, when I was looking before -- and I know that Legislators Gonsalves and Nicolello were on the committee, we passed it through committee because, in general, we're in favor of the program and it's 90 percent reimbursable. My question continued to be whether the bond authorization that we're voting on now was supported by the capital plan, and my concern is if it's not the ordinance, in and of itself, might not be proper and NIFA might have an issue. But if \$3.1 million was approved in 2011, then some of those items that I cumulated in 2011 were probably used for that 3.1 million,

MR. ARNOLD: I know that there -- some of that will be used for some of the buses being delivered early in the fall, but the balance of the buses that we're receiving require this new ordinance. I don't have the exact breakout in front of me.

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: I saw a total of 4.5 million in the 2011 capital budget, cumulating all of the, I'll call it, bus infrastructure items. I believe it was three items. We need 4.98 for this item, and that's why I asked if we had done anything in 11. Thank you for the information you gave. What was that clerk item number again?

MR. ARNOLD: That's a bond ordinance number. I'm not sure that's a clerk item.

That's Bond Ordinance 81-2011.

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So that was one of the items that I had looked at and used in the match from the 2011 capital budget. So we would have even a bigger shortfall than the 400,000.

CHAIRMAN NICOLELLO: Mr. Walker.

Just on the capital plan, it is -- I think we've said this repeatedly. It is a little different now with the advent of NIFA, having a capital plan. Why I say that is because this legislature and previous legislatures voted on the capital plan, then also authorized bonding upwards of hundreds and hundreds of millions of dollars. NIFA did not weigh in on all those bond authorization. Ιn fact, in many cases they have not even been asked to render a decision on the bond authorizations. We submitted the budget last year, NIFA approved \$70 million. And working in conjunction with the Department of Public Works, \$70 million out of \$110 million that were requested. We are now working in conjunction now one expanding those dollars from the original 70 here on out. So the budget that we will submit, the 2012 capital budget, will obviously be impacted by what this bond authorization is. This is the committee This is not the final vote of the full vote. legislature on the authorization. So you will

have a corresponding capital plan that

corresponds with the exact bonding authorization that you're asked to pass through the committee for the vote for the Full Legislature.

We believe that you will have ample time to vote on the capital plan and also on that bond referendum prior to when the bond ordinance needs to be adopted by the legislature.

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So the capital budget that we're going to get, Mr. Walker, is going to be 12/13, just 12, 12 for 13?

DEPUTY COUNTY EXECUTIVE WALKER: It will be 12. Again, as I said, not that it's meaningless, because no word of the executive and legislature is meaningless, but it does carry a different tone. A dollar figure that this legislature may approve and the county executive may agree with may not be the capital plan that NIFA is willing to, in fact, approve to go to the market for bonding. So it is -- it makes it a little different and it makes it a little bit harder. I know we have had separate conversations relative to this, as I did with many legislators that are on this committee, with respect to certain projects. Why aren't things

MR. KELLY: 588-12 is to authorize the county executive to sell a portion of real property known as Section 57, Block 59, Part of Lot 4B to the Village of Massapequa Park. purchase price is \$5,600. The property was appraised for 4,000 by the county's appraiser. The sale of the property was heard at a public hearing on October 27, 2011, and on November 9 and November 10 of 2011, OSPAC and the Planning Commission voted to recommend the sale. The property would be sold subject to all existing restrictions on the property that were in existence since the 1980's, imposed by the City of New York that it has to be used for park and parkway purposes and certain other restrictions that are contained in the settlement agreement between Nassau County and the City of New York from 1986. So if the Village wishes to do anything with the property, they would have to clear all those restrictions.

CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Questions or

MR. KELLY: Correct. And right now there's a cell tower in front of the Village Hall that they want to move to this location so it's not there and it's not in that area anymore.

Also, there is a Verizon cell tower that's nearby on a water tower for the Massapequa Water

The Village is very supportive of this, obviously.

So we're talking about a lot of work and -

agreement that if this property is used for forprofit purposes, if we sell it for profit and
take the restrictions off of the property, the

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So you're saying that whatever revenue the Village is going to get is going to be offset by the City getting a piece of it?

MR. KELLY: Or whatever deal they work out with the City; I'm not sure. What your question is, is wouldn't the County benefit financially from doing this, and I don't believe that -- from putting up a cell tower, not selling the property -- would they benefit financially from doing that. I'm not sure that we would because all the hoops that we would have to go through in order to get this done. So we would be spending county resources, spending county money. It's a very large administrative task to do something like that. So what we're doing is separating this property out from the rest of it,

selling it to the Village of Massapequa Park so they can take care of it. I don't know if they're ever going to be able to do it.

LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: How much of the money, we get for selling this, do we have to give to New York City?

MR. KELLY: We don't. Because under our settlement agreement it says that that doesn't apply, if we sell the property with all of the existing restrictions on it, and that's what we're doing.

But where a community such as here or such as the DPW land in Cedar Creek was asking us to provide a solution from a location that was not as desirable, we've done it. It seems hard for me to believe that we wouldn't end up making money for all the county taxpayers and at the same time
