#### PREFACE THE CDBG-R SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENT

The federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) has designated \$4,220,770 through the Nassau County Urban County Consortium Community Development Block Grant. The County applies for these funds via the CDBG "Substantial Amendment" process.

This Community Development Block Grant –Recovery (CDBG-R) Substantial Amendment is an amendment to the Nassau County Consolidated Plan and 2008 Annual Action Plan as submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This amendment is necessary to allow the use of new Federal HUD funding; all of the elements of the County's original 2008 Action Plan are hereby incorporated into this supplemental document.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) was signed into law on February 17, 2009, and appropriates \$787 billion for measures that will modernize our nation's infrastructure, enhance energy independence, expand educational opportunities, preserve and improve affordable health care, provide tax relief and protect those in greatest need. The Recovery Act includes \$1 billion in Community Development Block Grant Recovery (CDBG-R) funds to support a broad range of housing and community development projects that are "shovel-ready," i.e., can be implemented as soon as possible.

The County will receive \$4,220,770 in new CDBG-R funds that constitute a special allocation of 2008 CDBG funding. The County must give priority to projects that can award contracts by mid-June 2009. The purpose of this Substantial Amendment is to describe the County's proposed use of the CDBG-R funds. As required by HUD, the complete submission contains the following:

### Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

### Response:

### Areas of Greatest Need

In accordance with federal guidelines and requirements for the use of CDBG-R funding, the County will give priority to eligible activities within CDBG-eligible, currently-approved target areas. These areas will be given priority so that the County can expend funds quickly in accordance with CDBG-R guidance and in consideration of local competitive procurement practices and other federal and local requirements.

When considering activities for the use of CDBG-R funding, Nassau County reviewed projects and applications it had received in prior Notices of Funding Availability that the County considered for funding but did not have sufficient CDBG funds not committed to other projects.

In addition to the needs defined in the County's Consolidated Plan, County staff maintains a file of project suggestions from citizens, staff and elected officials. From that list, projects were considered based on the criteria outlined in the ARRA.

#### **Project Readiness**

As directed under the Recovery Act, the County will give priority to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 days of the grant agreement.

#### Low Income Targeting

All projects will comply with HUD regulations for eligible uses of funds, serving low-tomoderate income populations.

### (1) <u>Activity Name</u> Public Facilities and Improvements

#### (2) <u>Activity Narrative</u>:

Nassau County has public facility and improvement projects that it is undertaking in the Nassau Urban County Consortium. All of the public improvement and facilities projects being proposed were selected with the priority of awarding contracts within 120 days from the date that funds are made available to the Consortium. To ensure that this priority is met; the County has or will take the following actions during the time that this amendment is being reviewed:

- Undertake environmental reviews for all activities so as to be complete when funds are ready to be obligated.
- Initiate and/or complete architectural and engineering work to reduce the timeline for bidding.
- Projects have been identified that are either stand alone or a distinct component of a project to reduce dependency and reporting on other funding.

These public facilities and improvement projects meet the Recovery Act Objectives by providing much needed construction jobs and providing investment in infrastructure that will have a long term impact on Nassau County.

The activities selected meet the objectives of:

- Preserving jobs and promoting economic activity;
- Investing in infrastructure that will provide long term economic benefit to low and moderate income communities;
- Targeting low and moderate income communities and households most impacted by the recession.

The non-profit public facilities and improvement projects are for agencies that provide regional services for the low income population and the most vulnerable persons.

Below are project specific descriptions of the public facilities and improvements projects:

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: Public Facilities and Improvements - Village of Farmingdale – Farmingdale Streetscape Improvements

### (2) Activity Narrative:

These funds will provide for improvements to public parking lots and walkways in the Village of Farmingdale including design work, installation of energy efficient street lighting, and trees in the Central Business District.

Streetscape improvements will include the installation of energy efficient street lighting, promoting greater energy efficiency and cost savings for the Village of Farmingdale.

Farmingdale is currently revising its master plan with a new vision to redevelop its downtown with transit oriented development with a set aside for affordable housing. The Village has a train station near its downtown. This project will provide much needed infrastructure improvements to enhance the Village redevelopment plan.

#### B1 b. CDBG-R INFORMATION BY ACTIVITY (COMPLETE FOR <u>EACH</u> ACTIVITY)

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: Public Facilities and Improvements – Village of Westbury – Westbury Tiered Public Parking Lot Development

#### (2) Activity Narrative:

Provision of new and improved public facilities and infrastructure improvements for construction of a tiered public parking lot. This project is located in the Central Business District which is being redeveloped with transit oriented mix of uses.

The construction of tiered parking will support other redevelopment activities at the Westbury Theater, which will provide economic benefits to the area. Post Avenue is the traditional village center of Westbury and the project site is located in the heart of the Post Avenue business area. Restoration of the Westbury Village Movie House will result in the creation of more jobs, added property values within and all around the area, and an increase in the distribution of dollars and sales tax revenue, without creating an equivalent need for services. Increased assessment value results in the Village, school district and county recognizing greater tax revenue and that, in turn, will help to decrease the burden on existing tax payers.

### (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

Construction of tiered parking at the Westbury Theater will create an estimated 36 to 45 temporary construction jobs.

Reuse of the Westbury Theatre site will result in the creation of approximately 25 permanent jobs on-site. The project will support retail and other businesses within the Village of Westbury Central Business District, which will attract, create and sustain additional employment opportunities in the surrounding area.

The project will create a more sustainable downtown and enhance visual appeal and safety. Developers will be encouraged to incorporate green and energy efficient components in all their projects, consistent with cost feasibility.

This project is part of a larger economic redevelopment of the Village of Westbury including transit oriented development. The Westbury train station is a short walking distance to the downtown and to the Theatre project.

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: Public Facilities and Improvements – Town of Hempstead – Baldwin Streetscape Improvement Project

#### (2) Activity Narrative:

Improvements to public walkways including the installation of energy efficient street lighting and trees on Merrick Road between Grand Avenue and Harrison Avenue in the Baldwin Urban Renewal Area within the Town of Hempstead. The hamlet of Baldwin has experienced significant retail vacancies. The Town of Hempstead and Nassau County are undertaking a vision plan to revitalize Baldwin.

Provision of new and improved public facilities and infrastructure improvements to improve the environment for very low, low and moderate income households in identified target areas.

### (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

The Baldwin Streetscape Improvement Project is expected to result in approximately 40 to 50 construction related jobs. Approximately 14 permanent jobs will be created or retained as a result of the project.

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: PF&I – Non-Profit Public Facilities Projects / Nassau County – Economic Opportunity Commission of Nassau County: Roosevelt Center Expansion of Community Action Program / Head Start Program

#### (2) <u>Activity Narrative</u>:

Economic Opportunity Commission of Nassau County (EOC) owns two adjacent properties on Babylon Turnpike in Roosevelt. One building (281 Babylon Turnpike, Roosevelt, NY) houses their Community Action Program and their Head Start Program. The other building (303 Babylon Turnpike, Roosevelt, NY) had housed a weatherization program but has long been vacant. This project includes the gut rehabilitation of the vacant building to relocate and house the CAP program to 303 Babylon Turnpike. This will allow for the expansion of the Head Start program at 281 Babylon Turnpike

This project will allow for the utilization of two additional Full Year Head Start classrooms providing services to 34 additional pre-school children and their families.

The CAP Center at 303 Babylon Turnpike will provide space for classes for employment skills training and GED training for youth and adults, homework help and activities for youth, and much needed case management and community services for low income families.

The mission of the Economic Opportunity Commission (EOC) is to facilitate and strengthen individuals and families to move them out of poverty. EOC will be receiving additional funding under both the Head Start and the Community Services Block Grant programs under ARRA to provide operational support for these programs.

Roosevelt, NY is one of the communities most impacted by the housing crisis and the recession. The entire Roosevelt community has a HUD Neighborhood Stabilization risk score of 9.

## (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

The project will result in approximately 30 design/construction jobs. Relocation and expansion of EOC programs will result in the retention and/or creation of 6 FTE new jobs.

The County of Nassau will encourage the use of green and energy star components in all facilities renovations projects and rehabilitation projects, consistent with cost feasibility.

The Roosevelt School District was the most troubled in New York State. The NYS Department of Education has taken over the administration and operation of the school district. This Head Start expansion will provide much needed services.

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: PF&I – Non-Profit Public Facilities Projects / Nassau County – Circulo de la Hispanidad

### (2) Activity Narrative:

Installation of "green components" for a community center building that is under construction with the goal of meeting LEED standards.

The community center is located in Hempstead Village, in one of the areas most impacted in New York State by foreclosures. The neighborhood has a Neighborhood Stabilization risk score of 10 out of 10.

The community center will include a licensed child care center for 76 children including infants, toddlers, and pre-schoolers. The center will also house a NYS Department of Education charter

school. The community center will provide job training programs as well as GED classes. The community center will provide conference center space as well.

### (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

Jobs created by the proposed activity will be construction related. The number created will depend on the number of workers already employed for construction of the community center building. It is estimated that the CDBG-R project budget will provide 6 to 7 full-time equivalent construction jobs.

Once completed the community center will create over 80 full time equivalent jobs.

Provision of "green components" for a 35,000 square foot community center building that is under construction at 605 Peninsula Boulevard, Hempstead, NY, on a former brownfields site. The project is being developed with the goal of meeting Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) standards. This project represents the first LEED certified community center on Long Island.

Rehabilitation of the Marry Brennan INN (MBI) Soup Kitchen in Hempstead, NY. The project includes roof replacement, renovations of bathrooms, replacement of dining hall floor, and renovation of serving station

The Mary Brennan Inn Soup Kitchen serves men, women and children who are homeless or at risk of homelessness or low income. Approximately 440 guests frequent the soup kitchen daily. The number of guests are increasing due to the recession.

This project meets the Recovery Act objective of providing essential services to the homeless and impoverished.

It is estimated that the \$100,000 CDBG-R project budget will provide 10 full-time equivalent construction related jobs.

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: PF&I – Non-Profit Public Facilities Projects / Nassau County – Five Towns Community Center

#### (2) Activity Narrative:

Rehabilitation of existing building including energy efficiency upgrades and kitchen improvements to provide a safe and efficient community center to serve low/moderate income neighborhoods.

The Five Towns Community Center located in the economically distressed area of Inwood in the Town of Hempstead. Five Towns Community Center serves the needs of economically, socially, educationally and culturally disadvantaged persons through programs and services, including: Head Start, Youth Services, Substance Abuse Services, AIDS Services, Foreign Born Programs and a Senior Center. Rehabilitation of the existing Five Towns Community Center, including energy efficiency upgrades will help ensure provision of resources to persons with needs, while reducing energy needs of the facility. Improved energy efficiency is expected to reduce future operational impacts resulting from utility increases and thereby avoid reduction in services such as Head Start and other Youth Services.

### (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

Approximately 4 temporary construction jobs will result from the CDBG-R investment in this valuable community resource.

This activity will assist Five Towns Community Center to continue providing essential services to low and moderate income families thus enabling household adults to maintain existing jobs.

Long Island Power Authority conducted a complete energy audit of the facility and made recommendations for upgrades which will conserve energy and provide energy cost savings with a payback in about 2.5 years.

#### B2a. CDBG-R INFORMATION BY ACTIVITY (COMPLETE FOR <u>EACH</u> ACTIVITY)

(1) <u>Activity Name</u>: Housing Redevelopment – Bedell & Terrace Apartments, Hempstead Village

### (2) <u>Activity Narrative</u>:

Expansion of affordable housing. Funds will be used for site improvements associated with the redevelopment of a largely vacant and mostly uninhabitable 245 unit affordable housing project at Bedell & Terrace Avenues in Hempstead, NY. We anticipate the site improvements to be a separate activity from the housing redevelopment in order to meet the CDBG-R deadlines.

This housing development was home to what the Nassau County District Attorney Kathleen Rice describes as the "largest open air drug market in Nassau County". Efforts by the Nassau DA, Nassau County Police Department, and Village of Hempstead to rid the neighborhood of crime will be significantly enhanced by the redevelopment of this housing.

An affordable housing redeveloper has entered into a contract to purchase the property and is planning on closing on the project and starting renovations this summer. The redevelopment will include project based housing choice vouchers, low income housing tax credits, New York State grant funds, TCAP funds, ARRA weatherization funds, HOME Assistance Partnership Act funds, Neighborhood Stabilization Funds and Federal Home Loan Bank funds.

This housing redevelopment project will include energy efficient weatherization improvements funded through ARRA. This transit oriented development is located within walking distance from the Village commercial center and a multi-modal transit center.

### (3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs)).

It is estimated that the \$250,000 investment in site work will result in 10 temporary construction related jobs. The overall project will create approximately 95 construction jobs. It is anticipated that when completed approximately 1 full time property management job will be created and 6 management staff positions will be retained.

## (4) <u>Additional Activity Information:</u> (A description of how the activity will promote energy conservation, smart growth, green building technologies, or reduced pollution emissions, if applicable.)

The redevelopment project promotes smart growth concepts by providing higher density, modern and more energy efficient housing in an area served by public transportation and other community services.
