3	Committee is now in session. Please call the
4	roll.
5	CLERK MULLER: Legislator Wink?
6	LEGISLATOR WINK: Here.
7	CLERK MULLER: Legislator Jacobs?
8	LEGISLATOR JACOBS: Here.
9	CLERK MULLER: Ranking Member Abrahams?

18	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Present.
19	CLERK MULLER: We have a quorum.
20	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Thank you very
21	much.
22	We have one item for the Rules Committee,
23	and that's Contract E-149-13 with the Sheriff's
24	Department and Armor Correctional Health Services
25	of New York, Inc.

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2	Motion, please?
3	LEGISLATOR DUNNE: So moved.
4	LEGISLATOR KOPEL: Second.
5	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Moved by
6	Legislator Dunne, seconded by Legislator Kopel.
7	Who do we have here? I know Ms.
8	Loconsolo has been here also all day.
9	MR. MAY: We have counsel to the county
10	executive, Ms. Elizabeth Loconsolo, to answer any
11	questions on this item.
12	MS. LOCONSOLO: Good evening.
13	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Good evening,
14	Elizabeth.
15	MS. LOCONSOLO: With me is Captain
16	Michael Golio (phonetic) from the Nassau County
17	Sheriff's Department.
18	This is an amendment to the original
19	contract with Armor Correctional Health Services
20	of New York, which was executed initially in
21	2011. The contract, as passed by the
22	legislature, allowed for an additional two years.
23	This is the amendment to renew their services for
24	an additional two years.
25	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Any questions for
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2	Ms. Loconsolo?
3	(No verbal response.)
4	Any public comment? Yes. We have the
5	President of ShOA, John Jaronczyk, and the Vice
6	President, Rich Clarke. I forgot - COBA.
7	MR. JARONCZYK: President of COBA.
8	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: I know, John.
9	MR. JARONCZYK: Good evening, everyone.
10	My last intention is to try to delay this
11	proceeding any longer. I know it's been a very
12	long, trying day for everyone.
13	This contract is for inmate healthcare.
14	I'm the president of the Correctional Officers
15	Union. Inmate healthcare is not really in my
16	purview; that's something between the legislature
17	and the county executive and the sheriff.
18	My only concern is that my people work
19	inside that jail and there are also other CSEA
20	employees that work inside that jail. And when
21	there is an emergency medical condition in there,
22	I just want some assurance that they will be
23	taken care of.
24	I have been here before and I have
25	stressed some problems that happened early last
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2	year. Now, to Armor's credit and to the
3	sheriff's credit, there hasn't been any problems
4	for quite some time, and I'm hoping that's
5	because the problems were fixed. I'm just not
6	hoping that it's that we haven't had any issues.
7	I'm hoping those problems are corrected, and I
8	believe they are.
9	I am not here to oppose this thing. I
10	just want to get some assurances that my officers
11	are going to be protected.
12	There are a lot of infectious diseases in
13	there. It does appear that the infection control
14	nurse, there is no budgeted line item for that.
15	I don't know if someone else is going to be doing
16	those duties. Last year alone, 2012, we had
17	three correctional officers come down with M-R-S-
18	A, MRSA, that they contracted inside the jail and
19	brought home to their families. They need to be
20	protected.
21	And there is an amendment in here where
22	Armor will be providing vaccinations for
23	infectious diseases that the county provides.
24	They will just be administering them. That's a
25	good thing. That wasn't in the original
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2	contract.
3	So I'm not here opposing the contract. I
4	just want assurances that my men and women that
5	work inside that jail are going to be protected.
6	That's really all I have, unless anybody
7	has any questions.
8	But the issue with the infectious control
9	nurse, I think we should look into that to make
10	sure someone is doing those duties, because
11	that's a very important job inside a jail.
12	Obviously a jail is a dirty place, and once
13	someone gets a disease, they need to be
14	quarantined and the officers and the people that
15	surround that inmate have to be protected and
16	they have to be notified.
17	LEGISLATOR DUNNE: Through the Chair.
18	As Chair of the Public Safety Committee, I will
19	check into that tomorrow with the Sheriff.
20	MR. JARONCZYK: Okay.
21	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Ms. Loconsolo,
22	would you like to comment on it?
23	Thank you, John.
24	MS. LOCONSOLO: Yes. The infection
25	control duties do remain. What has changed from
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2	the original contract to this amendment is simply
3	that under the original contract a sick call
4	nurse was also responsible for infection control.
5	In this contract it's the nurse educator whose
6	additional duties are infection control. So
7	there was never an infection control nurse, under
8	either the original contract with Armor or the
9	amendment. So those duties to remain and we
10	recognize the importance, as does Armor, of
11	having somebody responsible for infection control
12	at the jail, and this amendment does have that.
13	LEGISLATOR DUNNE: Is that acceptable?
14	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: John, is that
15	okay?
16	MR. JARONCZYK: As long as the
17	department as long as the staff members know
18	who they can go to whenever there's an issue.
19	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Extremely
20	important, John.
21	MR. JARONCZYK: There's no problem with
22	that. And just that the staff needs to be
23	notified when there are conditions inside that
24	jail where they can bring home infectious
25	diseases.

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2	CHAIRWOMAN GONSALVES: Right. Extremely
3	important, John.
4	Any public comment?
5	(No verbal response.)
6	There being no other comments, I would
7	like to ask for a vote to accept the contract as
8	presented.
9	All those in favor signify by saying aye.
10	(Aye.)
11	Any opposed?
12	(No verbal response.)
13	The contract passes unanimously.
14	Again, John, Rich, thank you for being so
15	patient, and Elizabeth, and I forgot the
16	gentleman's name. It was a long day for all of
17	us. It ended on a good note, I think.
18	Again, thanks to all who stayed and
19	those, of course, who had to stay.
20	Motion to adjourn the Rules Committee,
21	signify by saying aye.
22	(Aye.)
23	Any opposed?
24	(No verbal response.)
25	The Rules Committee is adjourned. Thank
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2	you. Have a good night.
3	(Whereupon, the Rules Committee adjourned
4	at 9:21 p.m.)
