8	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Here.
9	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Ranking Member Laura
10	Curran?
11	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Here.
12	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Walker?
13	LEGISLATOR WALKER: Here.
14	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Muscarella?
15	LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Here.
16	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Don
17	MacKenzie?
18	LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Here.
19	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: And I'm here. We have
20	a quorum.
21	The first item to come before this
22	committee is Item 40-14, an ordinance
23	supplemental to the annual appropriation

3	Board.
4	41-14 is with the Traffic Safety Board.
5	42-14 is the same, with the Traffic
6	Safety Board.
7	54-14 is with the Traffic Safety Board.
8	If nobody on this committee has any
9	objection, we'll call all of them at the same
10	time. Is everybody okay with that?
11	LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: So moved.
12	LEGISLATOR WALKER: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Moved by Legislator
14	Vincent Muscarella, seconded by Legislator
15	Walker.
16	Who do we have to talk to us today?
17	MR. MAY: We have Mr. Christopher
18	Mistron from the Traffic Safety Board.
19	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Mr. Mistron,
20	could you give us a one at a time. We'll go
21	with 40-14 first.
22	MR. MISTRON: 40-14, the Stop DWI
23	Coordinator Association secured a grant through
24	the governor's traffic safety committee to
25	distribute to DWI programs around the state, for
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1	Public Safety Committee - 2-10-14 6
2	special holiday enforcement periods. This will
3	help supplement what monies we do receive through
4	our normal DWI program. Specifically earmarked
5	for this year is Memorial Day, July 4th, and
6	Labor Day. This is going to be shared, as the
7	backup shows or should show, between the NCPD as
8	well as several other village/city departments.
9	They are all working within cooperation during
10	these periods.
11	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions from any
12	legislator on this item? Yes.
13	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Basically all
14	three. You want to let him talk about all three?
15	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We're doing four
16	together. We'll have questions after you explain
17	each of them.
18	41-14 is what?
19	MR. MISTRON: It is our normal
20	appropriation for the Stop DWI grant itself. All
21	estimates of the expenditures are based upon
22	revenues that come in from the fines. It's
23	distributed through several different locations -
24	the NCPD, the other villages for enforcement, the
25	district attorney for funding, prosecutors for

2	the events, probation to be able to follow the
3	people once they go through the court,
4	rehabilitation, and then also administrative
5	expenses.
6	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: And then 42-14.
7	MR. MISTRON: 42-14 is the child safety
8	passenger grant. We receive a grant each year
9	that allows us to buy materials to continue doing
10	the program; something as easy as pool noodles,
11	which we use to address, rear facing seats, to
12	seats themselves. Again, it's for the ongoing
13	program both at the fitting station and the
14	mobile, when I come into the different
15	legislative districts.
16	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. And 54-14?
17	MR. MISTRON: Gone are the days of the
18	Buckle-Up grant and the Step grant, which was a
19	special traffic enforcement program. They've
20	been rolled into one grant called the Police
21	Traffic Services Grant. This particular grant is
22	to identify will be used for a specific period
23	of time in the end of May and June for Buckle-Up
24	enforcement as well as aggressive driving. And
25	the new component that has been instituted is
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2	pedestrian safety, where police will be operating
3	both in identifying driver's failure to yield to
4	pedestrians, as well as this year with the
5	training and the police officer will be
6	identifying pedestrians that are not crossing
7	properly also. So we will be trying to identify
8	all facets of safety.
9	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: And where are you going
10	to be doing that education?
11	MR. MISTRON: The education was already
12	done as part of last year with the police
13	officers. So the police officers were trained
14	last year; this year is when they're going to
15	start implementing programs to address the
16	pedestrian with the pedestrians and
17	enforcement purposes.
18	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Educating the public
19	MR. MISTRON: That's the ongoing thing
20	that traffic safety is doing. That we'll
21	actually see in the coming weeks with contracts
22	that we work with other groups to help educate.
23	Yes, we have an ongoing program right now within
24	the schools, with video that was produced and so
25	on, to try to continue the pedestrian. We had

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2	the opportunity, if you recall several months
3	back, to meet with both caucuses to discuss
4	coming into the districts and actually doing
5	education for the pedestrian safety with all of
6	the different civic groups and community groups
7	within your districts. So now we're at the point
8	where we will be able to start that.
9	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent.
10	Legislator Denenberg, you had a question
11	on three of these?
12	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Yeah. Hey,
13	Chris. Thanks for the work you do. One after
14	another, they're all good programs.
15	Is the money from these grant programs
16	reduced from last year, the same as last year?
17	What's the picture? This is three of your main
18	sources of funding, right?
19	MR. MISTRON: Well, when it comes to the
20	police traffic services grant, it's actually a
21	little bit more than the combined Stop I mean,
22	Buckle-Up and Step grants. I was able to secure
23	a little bit more money for purposes of
24	pedestrian. So that one is a little bit higher.
25	When it comes to the GWI, we're close to 30

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2	percent decrease. Unfortunately the revenue in
3	2012 - rather, 2013, came in quite less. I was
4	able to maintain the budget from prior year
5	surpluses. But the DWI grant is roughly a 30
6	percent decrease from prior years.
7	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: And that's
8	because of less?
9	MR. MISTRON: Because of less activity.
10	Variety of reasons.
11	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So that could be
12	good in a way, right?
13	MR. MISTRON: I would like to think it's
14	because they're not there.
15	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: All right. It
16	just so 30 percent reduced. How much in terms
17	of actual dollar figures is that?
18	MR. MISTRON: We're looking at about
19	\$230,000 less. The one thing about that is that
20	in terms of the educational programs that we've
21	been providing over the years, they are pretty
22	much being maintained. We were able to maintain
23	that. The one nice thing was that because of
24	that Stop DWI coordinator's grant for the holiday
25	enforcement, that was able to absorb some of the

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2	cost or provide monies for the reduction that we
3	had to enforcement.
4	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Did the
5	consolidations that went through, did that have
6	any effect on your budget? Would it have helped
7	because you're not going to as many precincts as
8	you were before? Did it hurt? Did it have no
9	effect?
10	MR. MISTRON: I don't believe it had
11	effect because you still have the same number of
12	sector cars out there. And when it comes to DWI,
13	those are assigned mostly as special patrols and
14	specifically assigned for DWI use. So it's not
15	necessarily the officer's doing, because of their
16	work, that make most of these arrests.
17	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: As far as your
18	classes or what you the service that you
19	perform, how did it change or affect you? Did it
20	add, reduce? You're not going to as many
21	precincts, I guess.
22	MR. MISTRON: We're looking that the
23	funding for enforcement has been reduced;
24	probably they took one of the largest hits.
25	Again, I was able to be able to fix or retrieve
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2	some of that lost money through another grant.
3	In overall dollars, maybe the PDs are seeing
4	maybe more like a 15 percent decrease.
5	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. Just
6	wanted to see what, if any, effect this
7	consolidation had on it. But I do see that your
8	funding is down quite a bit, so it's going to
9	make it a tougher year for you. But give the
10	great service you do, I hope you're able to find
11	money elsewhere.
12	Thanks.
13	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Denenberg,
14	did you want to break any of these down or do you
15	want to do it in bulk?
16	Legislator Curran.
17	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Thank you. For 54-
18	14, I'm just curious to know how the money is
19	divided among the villages, among the village
20	police departments. What's the criteria for
21	divvying it up?
22	MR. MISTRON: Normally what it was was if
23	you look at the last page, the breakdown, as a
24	matter of fact there were three columns. I was
25	going back and forth with the state with my
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2	original request, they followed up, and so. I
3	included all of that.
4	The monies that are distributed to the
5	villages is more based on historic enforcement
6	over the years. So what I do is at the end of
7	each grant period I get a progress report from
8	them. I actually sit down and I look to see
9	whether or not the arrests match what the grant
10	was for. In some cases, I have actually cut
11	complete money out of a department. An example
12	is if we're paying for a program. This is
13	enhancement money. So if I find that a
14	department made only their, say, seatbelt tickets
15	during the grant period, that's not the purpose
16	of this grant; it's to enhance not to supplant.
17	And the state comes after us for that, for not
18	monitoring it properly.
19	These numbers are from historic. Some of
20	the numbers are increased because of different
21	departments' participation in that training for
22	the pedestrian safety. And some of it is a
23	little bit - a few cuts because maybe during the
24	period they just didn't produce anything in the
25	time that they were on the road.

Item 40-14, 41-14, 42-5 14, and 54-14, all in favor indicate by saying 6 7 aye. 8 (Aye.) 9 Any against? 10 (No verbal response.) 11 It passes unanimously. 12 Chris, before you leave, I'd like to 13 entertain a motion to suspend the rules so we can 14 go to the addendum. LEGISLATOR WALKER: So moved. 15 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: 16 Second. 17 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Rose Walker, 18 seconded by Vince Muscarella. 19 The item you have on here, Chris, is 59-20 14. 21 MR. MISTRON: Right. 22 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: It was made by Rose 23 Walker, seconded by Vince Muscarella. 24 All in favor to have the rules suspended 25 say aye?

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2	(Aye.)
3	Any against?
4	(No verbal response.)
5	The rules are suspended.
6	Now, Chris, 59-14.
7	MR. MISTRON: What happens is that of
8	the monies that are collected for people who park
9	in handicapped spaces, the monies from the
10	surcharges are shared between, by law, between
11	the Department of Physically Challenged and
12	Traffic Safety. We utilize our funding share for
13	several educational components as well as special
14	programs for special needs.
15	One of the ones that we do is we have, as
16	part of our child safety seat program, we provide
17	special services for families with special needs
18	for trying to help those families on how to
19	properly choose, to fit some very unique and very
20	difficult seats, as well as we do special
21	education within the communities with regards to
22	special need transport and so on. So that is
23	what that money is earmarked for.
24	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator MacKenzie
25	made the motion on that, seconded by Legislator
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2	Muscarella.
3	I received some phone calls today that,
4	say, at L.A. Fitness in Levittown, the plows
5	plowed all of the snow into the handicapped
6	parking spots so the people that are handicapped
7	that were going to the gym couldn't park their
8	cars in the handicapped parking. Now that's
9	private parking, right? That has nothing to do
10	with
11	MR. MISTRON: That would be private
12	property. That has nothing to do with us.
13	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: So the owner would have
14	to make a complaint and then the police could do
15	it?
16	MR. MISTRON: I'm not enforcement. What
17	we can do is we can reach out to if a
18	complaint like that comes in, we can reach out to
19	the owners of the area to try to suggest that
20	they free up and clear out the handicapped
21	parking spaces.
22	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Because there were some
23	seniors and some young well, he was on my
24	football team in high school, a young guy. L.A.
25	Fitness in Levittown, if you'd give them a call I
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2	would appreciate it. I got a few calls on that.
3	MR. MISTRON: Sure.
4	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: On the item, which is
5	an ordinance to supplement the annual
6	appropriations ordinance in connection with the
7	Traffic Safety Board, Item 59-14; all in favor
8	indicate by saying aye.
9	(Aye.)
10	Any against?
11	(No verbal response.)
12	It passes unanimously.
13	The next item to come before us is Item
14	46-14, which is an ordinance supplemental to the
15	annual appropriation ordinance in connection with
16	the police department.
17	Item 47-14 is the same, with the police
18	department.
19	Item 48-14 is same thing, with the police
20	department.
21	We're going to bulk all three.
22	Moved by Legislator Walker, seconded by
23	Legislator MacKenzie.
24	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Good afternoon.
25	Sergeant Greg Stephanoff again.
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2	Item 46-14 is a domestic violent grant
3	for \$899,721. This is also to buy caper alarms,
4	that I was discussing earlier. These are the
5	alarms that with one push of a button, it will
6	send an alarm to our communications bureau and
7	then they will immediately dispatch a control
8	car.
9	These alarms are going to be dedicated,
10	per the Department of Justice, from the Office of
11	Violence Against Women for that purpose. They're
12	going to be dedicated for that purpose.
13	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any question on this
14	item? Legislator Curran.
15	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: I noticed last month
16	also, in some of these specific grants, either
17	from the state or from the federal government,
18	there are four specific things: terrorism,
19	violence against women, and I see it goes towards
20	overtime. And I just wanted to make sure that
21	that was proper, that it's a proper use of the
22	money because I know overtime has increased;
23	we've got to pay those bills. I want to make
24	sure if we approve it that it's proper and it
25	won't come to bite us later if those grants

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2	aren't used for what they're supposed to be used
3	for.
4	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: What we do in the
5	police department is with each grant we assign a
6	grant manager. I work in personnel and
7	accounting. We also make sure that the money
8	what we do is we assign a code. If someone is
9	working off a certain grant, they have to code it
10	to that grant. We make sure that the work is
11	performed. So we actually separate it in the
12	payroll system and we make sure that it's used
13	for that purpose.
14	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: So if it's overtime,
15	it's overtime for this particular purpose?
16	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes.
17	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Got it. Thanks.
18	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Legislator
19	Denenberg.
20	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Just to follow up
21	on Legislator Curran's question. If it's
22	overtime costs, I mean, is it overtime that is
23	related to Legislator Curran's question was
24	that the overtime would have to be related to the
25	work being done for the grant.

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2	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes.
3	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: But are we just
4	saving the work to be done by the grant for only
5	overtime because during regular time the officer
6	is doing something else?
7	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: No. A lot of the
8	grants are for enhanced patrols, in other words,
9	to do extra.
10	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. So it can
11	automatically go to overtime?
12	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: It will go out
13	because it will further whatever the roll call
14	is for that day, they'll enhance the roll call to
15	put out more cars. That's generally what the
16	grants do. The grants go above and beyond what
17	the normal patrol is.
18	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So it would
19	typically be overtime then?
20	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes. Because it's
21	going to be it's going to add to more than
22	what the compliment is.
23	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Enhanced patrol
24	or enhanced number of patrol?
25	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes.
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2	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. Thanks.
3	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Next item is 47-
4	14.
5	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: 47-14 is a justice
6	assistance grant. This grant is going to go for
7	purchasing of cameras that have been linked to
8	our shotspotter system. And when the system
9	recognizes a bullet shot, it's going to hone in
10	the cameras and I think triangulate in the
11	direction of where the shot comes from. There's
12	also some salary in there for some training also.
13	And it's going to be used for the overtime is
14	going to be used for gun violence, to patrols
15	against gun violence.
16	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: When the commissioner -
17	- I forget who the heck it was first brought
18	this into being with you brought us down to, I
19	think it was the rifle range, and showed us how
20	it worked, the triangulation, and that was just
21	with the sound.
22	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: This is going to
23	bring video into
24	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Are you going to give
25	us a demonstration? The member of this committee
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2	will be invited to
3	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: I could ask.
4	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Could you make that
5	possible so we could see how it works? It sounds
6	very interesting. It's technology at its best.
7	And 48-14 unless anybody has questions
8	on this. Okay. 48-14.
9	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: 48-14, this is a
10	port security grant for \$3,027,614. There is a
11	county match of \$1,018,454. This grant is in a
12	couple of parts.
13	The first part is going to outfit our AB
14	Bureau, the helicopters with day and night
15	cameras. And what that's going to do is that's
16	going to give a live feed directly to the ground
17	so that if the helicopter flying over, he doesn't
18	have to communicate by radio what he sees; it's
19	going to link directly to a command center or to
20	CB. Also, if there is an area of interest, they
21	can GPS exactly where the location is so that
22	marine bureau will be linked to this, because it
23	can be done over water or over land all over the
24	county.
25	This is in partnership with New York/New

2	Jersey Ports, because we're responsible for
3	maintaining the waterways, the Nassau County
4	waterways. It could also be used for any
5	incident. It's homeland security, but it also
6	could be used for any major incident that comes
7	around for the county.
8	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent.
9	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Also, the second
10	part is going to be target harden Marine Bureau.
11	It's going to be to put up fences, sensors, so
12	this way nobody can - if any attack against
13	marine bureau. It's for target hardening.
14	Then the third part is going to be to put
15	sonar in the boats so they could use the sonar
16	under the water, anything that's under the water
17	that has to be identified.
18	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. All three
19	parts are included in this one?
20	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: In this one grant,
21	yes.
22	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent.
23	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: And the match is
24	going to be from capital.
25	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. Any
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2	question from any legislator?
3	(No verbal response.)
4	Any public comment?
5	(No verbal response.)
6	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Wait. The match
7	is from capital?
8	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes.
9	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. Because
10	it's equipment that's more than a five year
11	lifespan?
12	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Yes.
13	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. Thanks.
14	LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: I'm sorry. Can I
15	just ask one question?
16	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Sure.
17	LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: In terms of the
18	target hardening, is that only at the East
19	Rockaway location or other marine bureau
20	locations?
21	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: I believe it's
22	going to be dedicated to wherever we need it for
23	the marine bureau locations. I think it's
24	focused on East Rockaway. If any of the
25	locations need anything.

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2	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That's north and south
3	shore. Terrific.
4	Any public comment?
5	(No verbal response.)
6	There being none; Items 46-14, 47-14, and
7	48-14, all in favor indicate by saying aye.
8	(Aye.)
9	Any against?
10	(No verbal response.)
11	It passes unanimously.
12	Thank you.
13	53-14 is an ordinance supplemental to the
14	annual appropriations ordinance in connection
15	with the district attorney's office.
16	Legislator Muscarella makes a motion,
17	seconded by Legislator Walker.
18	Who do we have to speak on this?
19	MR. McMANUS: Bob McManus, District
20	Attorney's Office.
21	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Mr. McManus,
22	this is about?
23	MR. McMANUS: Your approval of this
24	supplemental appropriation will enable the
25	district attorney's office to utilize grant
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2	funding awarded by the New York State Division of
3	Criminal Justice Services. We use this funding
4	to conduct investigations and prosecutions of
5	motor vehicle theft and insurance fraud cases.
6	Investigative efforts target healthcare
7	practitioners and auto body shops suspected of
8	committing fraud. This program also facilitates
9	cooperation between law enforcement agencies and
10	the insurance industry to combat this type of
11	criminal activity.
12	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Are there any questions
13	from any legislator?
14	(No verbal response.)
15	Any public comment?
16	(No verbal response.)
17	There being none; all those in favor
18	indicate by saying aye.
19	(Aye.)
