23	LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm here.

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2	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator Denise Ford.
3	Denise, I'm terribly sorry. Legislator Denise
4	Ford is with us. We have a full compliment. I'm
5	sorry, Denise.
6	Item 167-14 is our first item, which is
7	an ordinance supplemental to the annual
8	appropriations order in connection with the
9	district attorney's office.
10	Do we have somebody here from the
11	district attorney's office?
12	LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.
13	LEGISLATOR WALKER: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: It is moved by Denise
15	Ford, seconded by Rose Walker.
16	We have a number of things for the
17	district attorney's office. Would you mind us
18	taking them all at the same time?
19	MR. MAY: That would be great.
20	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Are there any
21	objections by the Minority? Okay.
22	Then we will also call 168-14, which is
23	an ordinance supplemental to the annual
24	appropriations ordinance in connection with the
25	

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2	Then Item 172 is a resolution authorizing
3	the county executive to execute an amendment to a
4	grant agreement between the County of Nassau,
5	acting on behalf of the district attorney's
6	office, and 100 Black Men of Long Island.
7	We have Item 178-14, which is an
8	ordinance supplemental to the annual
9	appropriations ordinance in connection with the
10	district attorney's office.
11	Item 179-14, which is an ordinance
12	supplemental to the annual appropriations
13	ordinance in connection with the district
14	attorney's office.
15	And we have 180-14, which is an ordinance
16	supplemental to the annual appropriations
17	ordinance in connection with the district
18	attorney's office.
19	Let's see if there is anything else.
20	184, which is a resolution authorizing
21	the county executive to execute a grant agreement
22	between the County of Nassau, acting on behalf of
23	the district attorney's office, and MADD Long
24	Island.
25	We had the motion from Denise Ford,
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2	seconded by Rose Marie Walker, that's continued
3	on to all of these.
4	On the items, let's go one by one.
5	MR. MAY: We have Mr. Bob McManus from
6	the district attorney's office.
7	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Mr. McManus.
8	MR. MCMANUS: Thank you.
9	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We'll go with 167
10	first.
11	MR. MCMANUS: Item 167 will allow the
12	district attorney's office to utilize federal
13	forfeiture funds.
14	The district attorney's office receives
15	federal forfeiture funds as a result of joint
16	investigations conducted in conjunction with
17	federal task forces or in conjunction with a
18	federal law enforcement agency.
19	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. Any questions on
20	this item?
21	(No verbal response.)
22	Then we'll go to the next one, which was
23	168.
24	MR. MCMANUS: A civil forfeiture is a
25	form of confiscation of assets conducted by the
	REGAL REPORTING SERVICES

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2	state. It applies to the proceeds or
3	instrumentalities of criminal activity. The
4	district attorney's office receives a portion of
5	these assets; the size of the portion depends on
6	the extent of our involvement and participation
7	in the investigation. This item will allow us to
8	utilize civil forfeiture funds that have been
9	awarded.
10	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. Are there
11	any questions from any legislators on this?
12	(No verbal response.)
13	There being none, we'll go to Item 172-
14	14.
15	MR. MCMANUS: Item 172 is a grant
16	agreement to allow the district attorney's office
17	to rent space from 100 Black Men that houses the
18	Counsel on Thought and Action, which is a program
19	instituted by the district attorney's office to
20	provide services to recently incarcerated
21	individuals.
22	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions from any
23	legislator on this?
24	(No verbal response.)
25	There being none; how about 178-14?
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2	MR. MCMANUS: Item 178 is to appropriate
3	civil forfeiture funds.
4	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Okay. 179-14.
5	MR. MCMANUS: Item 179 will allow us to
6	utilize federal forfeiture funds.
7	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. 180.
8	MR. MCMANUS: 180 is the same as 179; it
9	will allow us to use federal forfeiture funds
10	awarded by the Justice Department.
11	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions on any of
12	those from any of the legislators?
13	(No verbal response.)
14	There being none, we'll go over to 184.
15	MR. MCMANUS: Item 184 is an agreement
16	that will permit the district attorney's office
17	to utilize federal forfeiture funds to provide
18	funding to Mothers Against Drunk Driving of Long
19	Island for an awareness campaign to combat drunk
20	driving in Nassau County.
21	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions from any
22	of the legislators?
23	(No verbal response.)
24	Is there any public comment on any of
25	these items?
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2	(No verbal response.)
3	There being none; all in favor of all of
4	these items let me say them again so you know
5	what you're voting on Item 167-14, 168-14,
6	172-14, Item 178-14, 179-14, 180-14, and 184-14;
7	all in favor indicate by saying aye.
8	(Aye.)
9	Any against?
10	(No verbal response.)
11	They all pass unanimously.
12	MR. MCMANUS: Thank you.
13	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Thank you, Mr. McManus.
14	The next item to come before us is Item
15	170-14, an ordinance supplemental to the annual
16	appropriations ordinance in connection with the
17	Fire Commission.
18	Do we have somebody from the Fire
19	Commission here?
20	LEGISLATOR WALKER: So moved.
21	LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Second.
22	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Rose Walker,
23	seconded by Don MacKenzie.
24	Who do we have with us?
25	MR. MAY: We have John Priest from the
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2	Fire Commission.
3	Mr. Chairman, could we also call Clerk
4	Item 181-14?
5	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: No problem with that
6	from the Minority? Okay.
7	181-14 is an ordinance supplemental to
8	the annual appropriation ordinance in connection
9	with the Fire Commission.
10	And I assume Rose Walker and Don
11	MacKenzie are the motion and second.
12	MR. PRIEST: Good afternoon, Mr.
13	Chairman, members. Item Number 170 is in regard
14	to a grant from the Department of Homeland
15	Security Emergency Services for hazardous
16	materials equipment used to be divided amongst
17	the hazardous materials teams of the county, both
18	on the fire service and police side, in the
19	amount of \$47,000 to improve readiness.
20	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any questions from any
21	legislator on that?
22	(No verbal response.)
23	Next item is 181.
24	MR. PRIEST: 181 is a grant, again, from
25	Homeland Security, this time in regard to
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2	technical rescue. It's a grant in the amount of
3	just over \$147,000 to be again administered by
4	the fire marshal but split for equipment amongst
5	the technical rescue teams of the fire service.
6	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. Any
7	question from any legislator? Legislator Dave
8	Denenberg.
9	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: These funds, Mr.
10	Priest, they two questions: could they be
11	spent in any other way, do we make the decision
12	how they're spent, and how do we get these
13	grants?
14	MR. PRIEST: Okay. To the first
15	question, we met with the various team leaders
16	from the fire departments and on the hazmat side
17	also, our own team and the police department team
18	at the time of application to identify equipment
19	we would like to go for. That is identified in
20	the purpose of the grant when it's applied, and
21	pretty much you have to stick to that. You could
22	make minor changes, like the brand name of one
23	particular equipment to another. So that's all
24	identified out. Once the grant is accepted by
25	the county, we basically follow the wishes of the

Public Safety Committee - 5-5-14 13 1 2 groups, when it was applied, for what equipment 3 will be bought. 4 LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Thank you. 5 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any other legislators? 6 (No verbal response.) 7 Is there any public comment on 170 or 181? 8 9 (No verbal response.) 10 There being none; all in favor indicate 11 by saying aye. 12 (Aye.) 13 Any against? 14 (No verbal response.) 15 It passes through to Finance. 16 The next two items we'll call together, 17 if there is no objection from Legislator Curran -18 19 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: No objection. 20 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: They're both from the 21 police. 22 Item 174-14, which is an ordinance 23 amending Ordinance Number 535-1989 in relation to 24 fees for services relating to police vehicles, 25 impounded vehicles, and other towing. That's REGAL REPORTING SERVICES

3	175 is an ordinance to provide for police
4	towing zones within Nassau County.
5	Motion by Legislator MacKenzie, seconded

12	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: Good afternoon.
13	Sergeant Greg Stephanoff from the Police
14	Department.
15	Item 174, this item proposes to increase
16	fees for towing services relating to police
17	vehicles at the police department impounds. This
18	item will allow the tow companies to charge a
19	competitive rate for their towing services and
20	storage fees that they charge when they store
21	vehicles.
22	CHAIRMAN DUNNE: It sounds fair.
23	Any questions on this item? Yes.
24	Legislator Curran.
25	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: What is the impact

4	affect our budget. This is what the tow
5	companies are allowed to charge by contract when

9	SERGEANT STEPHANOFF: No.
10	LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Ah. Okay. Thank
11	you.

17	the police zones. This is for impounds also.
18	The county currently is broken up into 20 zones

23	the 135 for another zone, and also the entire
24	county we're breaking up for extremely large
25	vehicles, to have a company that specializes in
