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2	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Government Services.
3	Legislator Ford?
4	LEGISLATOR FORD: Here.
5	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Legislator Becker?
6	LEGISLATOR BECKER: Present.
7	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Legislator Schaefer is
8	here.
9	Legislator Jacobs?
10	LEGISLATOR JACOBS: Here.
11	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Legislator Denenberg?
12	Denenberg is not here.
13	Legislator Bynoe?
14	We have a quorum.
15	LEGISLATOR GONSALVES: I think it's in
16	order for all committees to sit at the same time,
17	just to expedite this item.
18	Now we shall begin with the presentation.
19	Who do we have here?
20	MR. MAY: We have
21	LEGISLATOR GONSALVES: First of all.
22	Wait a minute. Hold on. Government Services
23	introduce the item.
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2	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Here we go. This is an
3	ordinance to adopt the Nassau County budget for
4	Nassau Community College for the fiscal year
5	commencing September 1, 2014, and to appropriate
6	revenues to be raised by taxation for the
7	purposes of the College for that year, pursuant
8	to the provisions of the Education Law, County
9	Law, General Municipal Law, County Government
10	Law, and the Nassau County Administrative Code.
11	Motion, please?
12	LEGISLATOR BECKER: So moved.
13	LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Motion made by
15	Legislator Becker, seconded by Legislator
16	Schaefer.
17	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Legislator
18	Denenberg is here for the Finance and Government
19	Services Committee.
20	LEGISLATOR GONSALVES: Now, again,
21	in the interest of time, I'm asking that we
22	listen to the presentation by the College. This
23	will go to the Full Leg very shortly. It was
24	agreed upon that we will hear the presentation
25	made by Dr. Saunders and his administration to
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1	Government Services & Operations Committee - 6-30-14 6
2	give us the information that we can dwell upon
3	for the next Full Leg meeting.
4	Dr. Saunders, it's time. He's got three
5	committees all at once.
6	DR. SAUNDERS: Good afternoon. I'm not
7	exactly sure what just happened, but I can say
8	that I thank you.
9	LEGISLATOR GONSALVES: It's a little
10	confusing to I think each and every one of us up
11	here. But I have recessed rules. I have to
12	unrecess it so that you can speak. So it's
13	unrecessed.
14	DR. SAUNDERS: Let me just start by
15	saying thank you for making the necessary
16	adjustments to allow me to present my statement
17	at this point.
18	Presiding Officer Gonsalves, Minority
19	Leader Abrahams and members of the committees, I
20	would like to thank you for providing me with
21	this opportunity to discuss the Nassau Community
22	College budget for fiscal year 2014/2015.
23	Once again, I believe that the budget for
24	the upcoming year successfully balances the need
25	to fulfill the College's mission by maintaining
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1	Government Services & Operations Committee - 6-30-14 7
2	the affordable high quality education that we
3	offer to our students while, at the same time,
4	achieving this objective in a fiscally
5	responsible manner.
6	I thought I would start off my remarks by
7	referencing the latest issue of the College's
8	newsletter, Nexus. What has just been
9	distributed to you is a pre-production copy. The
10	actual publication, which has a higher print
11	resolution to it, should be available in a few
12	days. I believe that just perusing some of the
13	headlines will give you a real sense of the
14	breadth and depth of NCC's commitment to its
15	students and to the community, as well as the
16	accomplishments of our students and our dedicated
17	faculty. These headlines include: NCC's Day of
18	Service: Educating the Mind - Benefitting the
19	Community; Thirteen NCC Students Win SUNY Student
20	Chancellor's Awards for Excellence; Putting Words
21	Into Action: NCC Vets Go to Washington and Storm
22	the Hill; The Performing Arts at Nassau Community
23	College: Putting on a Show, and so much more;
24	NCC Speech & Debate Team: Award Winners at World
25	Championships; NCC's Men's Tennis Team: National
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1	Government Services & Operations Committee - 6-30-14 8
2	Champions; and Professor Lisa Bastiaans Named
3	Distinguished Professor by the State University
4	of New York Board of Trustees.
5	At a time when the default function in
6	the public debate on so many issues is skepticism
7	and cynicism, Nassau Community College will
8	continue to follow the exhortation of the Chair
9	of the NCC Board of Trustees, Dr. Jorge Gardyn,
10	who, in his remarks at the graduation of over
11	3,400 students last month, urged the graduates to
12	make the good, better and to make the better,
13	best. With your support over the years, we have
14	been able to accomplish this, even amidst trying
15	times, and, with your continued support, we will
16	successfully persist on into the future.
17	In particular, I would like to thank you
18	for your support of the College's capital
19	projects that have enabled us to enhance the
20	educational offerings that we can provide to our
21	students as well as to upgrade the safety and
22	quality of campus life for all of the members of
23	the college community and for those who visit the
24	campus. It is because of this support from the
25	County that we have been able to access an equal

2	amount of state capital funding. These upgrades
3	do not end with the millions of dollars that have
4	been spent in improving our parking facilities.
5	But the reality is that for many students,
6	faculty, staff and visitors, they do, as a
7	practical matter, begin their day at these
8	parking facilities every day. It is very much
9	appreciated.
10	I know that you know are interested in
11	the budget basics, and here they are.
12	First, for the sixth consecutive year,
13	the budget does not assume an increase in the
14	property tax allocated to the College. As the
15	county executive and members of the legislature
16	know, several months ago I took soundings as to
17	the receptivity for a tax increase. The message
18	I received back was pretty clear, and this budget
19	reflects that message. Certainly, a case could
20	be made that the current tax burden per household
21	for the College is relatively modest and that an
22	increase on top of that would not be
23	unreasonable. But I am also aware of the
24	substance of the course, Reality 101, and this
25	budget reflects that reality. Having said that,

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2	there is nevertheless, the competing reality that
3	the issue of a tax increase needs to be revisited
4	in the coming years for the College's long-term
5	fiscal sustainability.
6	Second, the level of spending called for
7	in the upcoming budget is \$216.6 million, which
8	is an increase of 1.3 percent from the current
9	budget as adopted last year. This increase in
10	spending consists largely of increases for health
11	benefits, pension contributions, the contract
12	with the CSEA, and it assumes the approval by
13	this Legislature of the recently negotiated
14	contract with the full-time union, the NCCFT.
15	Third, the budget calls for an annual
16	tuition increase of \$146 for an annual total of
17	\$4,234. Of course, no one likes a tuition
18	increase. However, to put this issue in context,
19	I have also asked that there be distributed to
20	the members of the committee a listing of the
21	tuitions and tuition increases in area colleges.
22	As you can see, Nassau Community College has the
23	lowest tuition of any of these institutions,
24	including Suffolk County Community College and
25	the community colleges of the City University of
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1	Government Services & Operations Committee - 6-30-14 11
2	New York.
3	I would also note that in this budget
4	there are no fee increases or new fees for the
5	students. As such, I believe that this budget
6	allows us to continue to fulfill our mission as
7	affordable, high quality institution of higher
8	education.
9	Fourth, the budget calls for using
10	approximately \$2.5 million in fund balance. This
11	is a matter of concern because although our
12	remaining fund balance is still almost \$7.9
13	million, that amount is a relatively small amount
14	for an institution with an operating budget of
15	\$216.6 million. A large part of the reason for
16	the reduction this year is that it will fund the
17	first year of the proposed agreement with NCCFT.
18	At the time the budget was being constructed, we
19	did not know the parameters of the settlement,
20	and so the decision was made to look to fund
21	balance for that first year. However, it is our
22	intent to fund the subsequent years of that
23	contract out of normal operating revenues.
24	Before closing, I would like to address
25	two other issues that are likely to be on your
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1	Government Services & Operations Committee - 6-30-14 12
2	minds.
3	First, there has been a significant
4	amount of attention given to the County
5	Comptroller's recent report on graduation and
6	transfer rates. As you know, I have communicated
7	my concerns to the county executive and the
8	legislature regarding the methodology of this
9	report and the comptroller's conclusions. This
10	is not to say that I disagree with every
11	statement in the comptroller's report. I
12	certainly agree with the portion that states,
13	"NCC Provides an invaluable service to thousands
14	of Nassau County residents, offering an
15	affordable higher education at a time when
16	tuition at private institutions is soaring." But
17	I believe that it is impossible to reconcile his
18	more negative comments about the quality of the
19	educational experience offered by NCC when you
20	consider the initiatives and the accomplishments
21	of our students and faculty, such as those that I
22	highlighted in the beginning of my remarks when I
23	referenced to the subjects covered in the
24	College's most recent newsletter.
25	It is not my intent to go over in detail
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2	my concerns about the methodology underpinning
3	the comptroller's report. And let me say from
4	the outset that the issues of graduation and
5	transfer rates being below our hopes and
6	expectations is a real one, which we have
7	directed our attention to and brought to the
8	county's attention before the comptroller issued
9	his report. This is an issue that is, in fact, a
10	concern of all community colleges, even those
11	with graduation and transfer rates higher than
12	NCC's. We are exploring the reasons behind the
13	decline, and it will take the commitment of all
14	members of the campus community to diagnose the
15	causes and support meaningful and concrete
16	solutions. I believe that the commitment is
17	there and will be sustained.
18	I do, however, have to take note that the
19	comptroller's suggestion that the primary causes
20	for the decline in these rates is campus turmoil,
21	does seem to fly in the face of the data in his
22	own report. Suffolk County Community College and
23	Westchester Community College also experienced
24	declines in the graduation and transfer rates,
25	but the comptroller's report does not discuss any

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2	campus turmoil that they might have experienced.
3	Also, the comptroller's report sets out a
4	timeline of the campus turmoil that includes the
5	period from 2011 to 2012 when Nassau Community
6	College's graduation and transfer rates actually
7	rebounded by approximately 20 percent. I would
8	also note that, according to the comptroller's
9	report, Suffolk and Westchester did not
10	experience a similar rebound during that same
11	period. So, I stand by earlier statements that
12	the comptroller's linking any decline in Nassau
13	Community College's graduation and transfer rates
14	at NCC to campus turmoil is overstated and
15	unsubstantiated. Nevertheless, let me reiterate,
16	work to improve the graduation and transfer rates
17	does need to be done, and members of the campus
18	community are prepared to roll up their
19	collective sleeves to do it.
20	Second, I also want to report on an item
21	that was mentioned by the comptroller last year
22	dealing with the accounts receivable at NCC.
23	These are monies owed to the College,
24	including from unpaid tuition from students. At
25	the time, the comptroller reported that from 2007
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2	to 2011, Nassau Community College had \$14.2
3	million in account receivables. Last year, we
4	pointed out that the number had been reduced by
5	approximately \$4 million from the time period the
6	comptroller reviewed to July of 2013. That
7	reduction in the accounts receivable can be
8	attributed to the steps that had been instituted
9	by the College during the subsequent time period
10	of the comptroller's report. These steps,
11	including not allowing a student to register if
12	he or she has bills in arrears and the increased
13	use of collection agencies as a matter of last
14	resort continue to bear fruit. As a result, the
15	current level of the accounts receivable for the
16	time period included in the comptroller's audit
17	is \$9.7 million. We anticipate making further
18	progress in dealing with the accounts receivable.
19	Currently, we are collecting 95 percent of the
20	overall receivables owed to us at the beginning
21	of each semester. Again, we are committed to
22	exploring ways to make additional progress in
23	this area, and we are confident based on the
24	experience of our current efforts that we will.
25	In conclusion, I would like to thank the

2	members of this committee and of the legislature
3	as a whole for your continued support of Nassau
4	Community College. Yes, challenges remain ahead
5	of us which will require ingenuity and
6	persistence to overcome. But I believe that the
7	College is up to the task for the benefit of our
8	students, their aspirations, and the communities
9	in which they live.
10	Thank you very much.
11	LEGISLATOR JACOBS: I hope I'm on it.
12	I'm a little confused as to which we're committee
13	we're doing.
14	Let me just say this to you. I'm one of
15	these people that believes in and has always
16	backed and obviously has been a great friend to
17	Nassau Community College, just as Nassau
18	Community College, in my mind, has been a great
19	friend, a tremendous help, and a terrific
20	backbone for so many students in our communities,
21	in the county, throughout the county, throughout
22	all communities that really desperately need a
23	two year point where they could get their
24	finances together to perhaps to then be able to
25	go to the next step. I have never diminished

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2	that in my mind. I have always appreciated that.
3	And I want to take my hat off to you
4	because we all know that the state had put a cap
5	of two percent for all school districts. Most
6	stayed within that two percent cap. A few even
7	were able to get their budget passed the second
8	time around, going above the cap. But you were
9	very wise, I believe, in the College because you
10	knew this county has held their tax increases to
11	zero for quite a few years now. You didn't even
12	go with fee increases to make up that difference.
13	And as much as I know how difficult I have
14	nine grandchildren, three of them are in college,
15	so I know what my children are going through with
16	that. But I have to tell you that my hat goes
17	off to you that you are the lowest in the display
18	that you gave us of all the tuitions throughout
19	the state.
20	I've always felt it was a jewel in our
21	crown to have you. I always felt that in terms
22	of being a bargain, this is a bargain. I read
23	Mr. Maragos's report and I have to tell you that
24	I don't think in any way, shape, or form he
25	convinced me that the quality of education has
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2	diminished. He said it. I can say anything. I
3	can say it's raining outside and see sun and then
4	I have to prove it to you that it's really
5	raining. I don't see where the education, the
6	quality of education has diminished. So I really
7	find fault in the report with that. I'm sure Mr.
8	Maragos felt it was a very good report.
9	The reality is that you've got a great
10	school, that you help to give people a choice
11	when people are falling on hard times. Who knows
12	if maybe the graduation rate has diminished
13	because certain points of the economy have
14	improved and maybe a lot of young people are able
15	to leave community college and go on before they
16	graduate from college. So I wouldn't want to
17	attach any validity to just statements made in
18	the air.
19	I go with the fact that you've been a big
20	plus for us. You've always been available. It's
21	not like unfortunately it's an increase in
22	tuition; that I feel for the students very much.
23	Obviously, throughout the country that is going
24	on. You've stayed below levels of other colleges
25	that are comparable and yet giving excellent

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2	education.
3	I wish you my best in your going forward
4	and continuing your excellence. I hope the
5	graduation rate increases. If the fact for the
6	decrease isn't that students have left to go on
7	to four year schools sooner than their graduation
8	date. That will only take time, like you said,
9	to process, to review, and to see if there is a
10	problem, where it might exist.
11	In my estimation, and I was a teacher,
12	and I am an educator. The worse thing that I
13	could ever hear from someone is that they cannot
14	afford to go to college. In this day and age,
15	unfortunately, just like in prior many prior
16	years ago, high school was the pivotal point to
17	get through high school. You not only need your
18	bachelor's, in many cases you need your master's
19	to even go on to teach and to do anything that
20	you really have your mindset.
21	I applaud you. I appreciate it. I like
22	the fact that you kept tight with your budget in
23	recognition of reality, like you said. And
24	congratulations.
25	DR. SAUNDERS: Thank you very much.
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2	LEGISLATOR JACOBS: You're welcome.
3	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Legislator Ford.
4	LEGISLATOR FORD: I'm over here,
5	President Saunders.
6	I concur with Legislator Jacobs. I think
7	Nassau Community College is an absolutely jewel,
8	especially here in Nassau County.
9	One of my sons had the pleasure of going
10	there. Of course he stayed for four years
11	because he needed to get his credits. It was a
12	great education for him without incurring a lot
13	of the cost. My other son went to a private
14	college and that was just a mere \$47,000 a year
15	as compared to the tuition that my Harry paid.
16	For me, I think they do get a good
17	education. It's a great institution. And I
18	think it helps. A lot of times, like Judy was
19	saying, now a days it's not just a high school
20	diploma that will get you into a lot of the jobs.
21	Even with Civil Service, you need some college
22	credits. For so many students, for many young
23	people who know that they don't want to enter
24	into professions such as a doctor, a teacher, a
25	lawyer, for them to be able to accrue those

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credits that they need for some jobs, for some
positions out there, it's a great way of getting
them without incurring a great cost. And I know
a lot of students also use Nassau Community
College as a way of getting basically what we
used to refer to as liberal arts credits under
their belt so that they can then afford to go
away to a four year college. So I commend you.
And I also like your approach, that
rather than looking at the decline in the
graduation rate as just fluffing it off, you want
to see what was the reason for it. And to try to
do whatever you can to find the cause and to
change the course with the graduation rates, and
I think that you are going to find that answer.
For me, I know sitting out the audience,
going out there to Nassau Community College, the
parking, the parking was a big concern for me. I
had many of my residents call up about it. And I
have to commend you. The College did respond and
took the necessary action to give better parking,
better lighting, and a better parking environment
for the students. And I thank you very much for
everything.

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2	DR. SAUNDERS: Thank you very much.
3	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Any public comment?
4	(No verbal response.)
5	Legislator Denenberg.
6	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Let's talk about
7	the tuition increase. I'm sure you're proposing
8	this and you think it's a fair increase. But
9	given some of the negative publicity that's come
10	out recently, you don't think that enrollment is
11	going to be effected by the increase because
12	comparatively our increase is less than in other
13	areas?
14	DR. SAUNDERS: I think that by virtue of
15	the fact that our increase is less than other
16	areas, it will increase the consideration for
17	students coming to Nassau in contrast to other
18	institutions.
19	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Okay. I would
20	
20	think if Suffolk's going up 250 and we're only
21	think if Suffolk's going up 250 and we're only going up 150 that that is a consideration. What
21	going up 150 that that is a consideration. What
21 22	going up 150 that that is a consideration. What about New York City?
21 22 23	going up 150 that that is a consideration. What about New York City? DR. SAUNDERS: We're lower than the CUNY

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2	going up?
3	DR. SAUNDERS: I have a sheet that I
4	distributed that shows the breakdown of all of
5	the increases of the institutions.
6	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: I see CUNY is
7	7.1. Nassau is 3.6.
8	DR. SAUNDERS: 3.6
9	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: Westchester is
10	1.9 but still higher, right?
11	LEGISLATOR JACOBS: Yes.
12	LEGISLATOR DENENBERG: So what's your
13	plan to address the issue with graduation and
14	some of the negative publicity that was, in fact,
15	I think even today put in Newsday.
16	DR. SAUNDERS: We have a rather
17	comprehensive plan. The first that we're doing
18	is that we are just exploring to identify what
19	the exact problems are. We have made
20	presentations to both the democratic and
21	republican caucus on Nassau Community College by
22	the numbers, which has identified what we see as
23	some of the initial concerns that we should focus
24	our attention on, in terms of drilling down and
25	getting additional information to positively

2	impact what's happening to our students. We will
3	continue that process. We will continue to look
4	at the numbers to make sure that the numbers are
5	accurate and to utilize all of the resources that
6	we have available to us.
7	A component in our most recent contract
8	from the NCCFT is the creation of a retention
9	committee by the full time faculty to look at
10	multiple strategies that can be employed by
11	academic areas to impact our students more
12	positively in terms of their experience every day
13	in the classroom and helping them to address
14	those deficiencies that they have in a way that
15	will result in a higher level of success.
16	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: I'm sorry. Dr.
17	Saunders
18	DR. SAUNDERS: Yes.
19	LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Thank you for
20	taking the time, for being here today. And we
21	look forward to asking our more in-depth
22	questions in two weeks, as we agreed to with the
23	majority. But thank you.
24	DR. SAUNDERS: You're very welcome.
25	Thank you very much.

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2	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Now, just for the
3	Government Services Committee, all those in favor
4	of the motion, to pass this through to the Full
5	Leg, please say aye.
6	(Aye.)
7	Any opposed?
8	(No verbal response.)
9	The motion passes.
10	Motion to adjourn, please?
11	LEGISLATOR BECKER: So moved.
12	LEGISLATOR SCHAEFER: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN KOPEL: Seconded by Legislator
14	Schaefer, motion by Becker.
15	All those in favor of adjourning the
16	Government Services Committee please say aye.
