On January 5th, the 5th annual Ham Radio University was held at Briarcliffe College. As advertised it was "A day of education to share ideas, experiences, knowledge and fellowship among Amateur Radio operators" and as usual it did not disappoint.

The keynote speaker was Mike Lisenco N2YYB. There were many opportunities to expand your knowledge with over 28 forums. Among them several new forums were offered, including EC-001 (Emergency Communication) test, Basic IRLP (Internet Radio Linking Project), D Star (Digital Smart Technologies for Amateur Radio), World Radio Sport Team Championship (contesting teams), LINUX (free operating system provides your PC with all of the usual features, including lots of ham radio applications), and HAM RADIO 1 and 2.

# <u>Characteristics of the Incident Command System: Part 2</u> <u>Understanding the Responsibilities of the Division Supervisor</u> Command and Control Series

Division or Group Supervisors report to the Operations Section Chief (OSC) when activated. Supervisors are responsible for the implementation of their assigned portion of the Incident Action Plan (IAP). They are also responsible for the assignment of resources within their Division or Group, reporting on the progress of control operations, and the status of resources within their Division or Group. Division Supervisors are assigned to a specific geographical area of an incident. Group Supervisors are assigned to accomplish specific functions within the incident (i.e., Hazardous Material, Medical).

- Implement IAP for Division or Group.
- Provide IAP to Strike Team Leaders, when available.
- Identify increments assigned to the Division or Group.
- Review assignments and incident activities with subordinates and assign tasks.
- Ensure that Incident Communications and/or Resources Unit are advised of all changes in status of resources assigned to the Division or Group.
- Coordinate activities with adjacent Divisions or Groups.
- Determine need for assistance on assigned tasks.
- Submit situation and resources status information to Operations Branch Directors or OSC.
- Report hazardous situations, special occurrences or significant events (e.g., accidents, sickness) to immediate supervisor.
- Ensure that assigned personnel and equipment get to and from assignments in a timely and orderly manner.
- Resolve logistics problems within the Division or Group.
- Participate in the development of tactical plans for next operational period.
- Maintain Unit/Activity Log (Incident Command System Form 214).

# **Benefits For All**

**Evaluate**: to judge or determine the significance, worth, or quality of something.

When you complete a training class with CERT you are often asked to fill out an *evaluation form* at the completion of it. The idea behind this is not just to ask for compliments, but to give the instructors and the leadership at CERT the best chance to determine the quality of that training.

The word "evaluation" often has a negative connotation, and it invokes relative emotional responses, such as nervousness, fear and anxiety. However, when approached carefully and in a considerate, respectful fashion, formal instructor evaluations can be beneficial for the instructor, the material, the students and the organization. Scheduled formal and informal evaluations can also serve the purpose of establishing a precedent and routine so that visits are neither unexpected nor looked at with trepidation.

The best instructors continually reflect and hone their delivery skills, but it is easy to become complacent as an instructor and teach on "autopilot," especially for those who are extremely knowledgeable or considered experts in their fields, or for those who have taught the same material a great deal.

Likewise, course materials that may have been current and on target at the time of development may now need a revision, but this will sometimes be overlooked in the shadow of a heavily experienced teacher who delivers material outside the established text, not realizing that the text may no longer be current. During a formal evaluation, a variety of classroom, instructor and course material elements can be observed, including student interest and participation, time management, teaching and classroom management strategies, routines, course objectives, and the effectiveness of classroom lessons and projects.

A formal evaluation provides an opportunity for the observer to share a dialogue with the instructor that encourages an examination of the materials, goals and strategies employed by the instructor in order to provide the best environment for the students to explore and fulfill the learning objectives of the course. During this dialogue, it is imperative that the observer provide anecdotal feedback of what worked well and what might need improvement. A balanced approach will create a positive, healthy atmosphere, which is much more conducive to all around improvement.

# Spring Time Pet Tips from the Nassau County SPCA



Yes, spring! Everybody wants to get outside and enjoy the sunshine and warmer weather. Here are some tips to keep your pets and wildlife safe as you enjoy yourselves.

Before your dogs and cats start frolicking outside, make sure their vaccines are up-to-date, in particular Parvo (for dogs) and Rabies (for dogs and cats). Parvo is a deadly disease that can easily be prevented. Puppies need a series of three vaccines. Your new puppy should not visit public parks and other areas frequented by other dogs until their vaccines are finished. Rabies vaccines are required by state law for both dogs and cats.

Dog licenses are required by towns and cities across the state. Licensing your dog is an easy way to stay in compliance with your town laws as well as ensure that your dog is current on his or her Rabies vaccine. It's easy to license your dog in any town or city. Simply bring an up-to-date Rabies certificate into your local town or city hall, and they will happily issue you a license and tag.

ID tags are not just a fashion statement. They save lives. Both dogs and cats should wear tags at all times. Most animals entering animal shelters are not wearing tags and do not have microchips, making it very hard to reunite them with their owners. You can make metal tags with your name and phone number very cheaply at most large pet stores. Microchips are available from your veterinarian.

Leash, fence, or monitor pets outdoors. Beautiful weather makes it tempting to let your dog go outside unattended. Rabbits should be brought indoors each evening and never left unattended outdoors. Cats should never go outside unattended!

Bird lovers, please remember to place your bird in its cage before you open windows.

Flea, tick, and heartworm treatments are important for all pets that go outside. Medications are available from your vet. *Never mix dog and cat medications; they are different.*PAGE 7

Horse owners, spring is the time to get back into a riding routine, put horses out on pasture and clean up after a long winter. If your horse is barefoot or if you pulled her shoes for the winter, it's time to call the farrier again. Even if you plan on keeping your horse barefoot, she probably needs a trim so she can be comfortable when you go on rides.

Beware poisonous plants. Some flowers and plants are poisonous to pets. Lawn fertilizers, cocoa bean mulch, and rodent poison are other pet hazards that appear frequently in the spring. If you suspect poisoning go to the veterinarian immediately.

Spay or neuter pets and "community" cats. This is the calm before the storm...of kitten season. Every summer, shelters nationwide are overwhelmed with homeless cats and kittens. Many more are left on the streets, and many die. Please get your cat sterilized now if she isn't already. If you are feeding a stray, she will get pregnant soon and can have as many as 3 litters (15 kittens or more!) this season

Leave baby wildlife alone. Baby rabbits, birds, and other critters are arriving. Keeping your dog on a leash and your cat indoors will help these babies survive. Experts' biggest tip if you find a young wild animal: leave it alone.

As we humans do our spring cleaning, we should watch for wildlife while mowing, raking, and tidying our property. Block dryer vents and chimney pipes to prevent nests.

Be smart about pets in cars. Never leave your pet locked in your car--even "just for a few minutes" or "with the windows cracked." Your pet can suffer heat stroke quickly even on a mild day. *Dogs and cats can't sweat to cool off.* 

And while we all know dogs love to feel the wind on their furry faces, allowing them to ride in the bed of pick-up trucks or stick their heads out of moving car windows is dangerous. Flying debris and insects can cause ear or eye injuries and lung infections, and abrupt stops or turns can cause major injury, or worse.

Following these tips will make spring safer for your beloved critters and the wildlife around our homes
