# New York State - Citizens Preparedness Corp. Citizen Preparedness Training Program February 1st 2014 - SUNY Farmingdale

In response to increasing major disasters across the state, the NYS Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (NYS DHSES) has embarked on a program not unlike CERT to help train citizens of New York State on the basics needed before, during and after a major event.



Several CERTs attended this training program with the goal of understanding what the state curriculum is about and how our program can offer advanced training to supplement the state program.

CERT training was mentioned in one of the first slides as a way to get involved in the preparedness process. Presented by the New York National Guard, this 2 hour training session exposed the average civilian to many of the topics included in our CERT Basic class.

The NY National Guard is the premiere state level emergency response organization reporting directly to the Governor. They will be holding seminars across NY with the goal of training and equipping a much larger number of citizens than CERT could alone.

Sessions in Staten Island and Long Island are just the first of an ongoing program to teach the initial topics by which citizens should advance their training. As an added incentive, a basic Go-Bag was presented to each participant. This free Go-Bag included basic PPE

As we have all seen and experienced in the last few years, anything and everything can possibly befall us and the homes and lives we have built over the years. And as we can imagine, after a disaster or any event where you incur a loss it is often hard to remember every item that you no longer have.

One of the ways you can protect yourself is to create and maintain an accurate and up to date Home Inventory. It is one of the best ways to make the most of your homeowners or renters insurance, and having one makes filing a claim easier and more efficient.


A Home Inventory is simply a list of your personal possessions along with their estimated financial value. You can create such an inventory in a few different ways. You can go the simple, low tech route by writing down everything in a notebook and keeping receipts in a folder, or if you are slightly computer savvy create a spreadsheet that is easy to update and keep on a flash drive or CD at work or a family members home. You can choose to take advantage of technology and use a digital camera or smart phone to take pictures and/or videotape your belongings in order to have a visual record. Finally, you can take benefit from the newest technology and use one of the many Smartphone Apps created for this task.

While any Home Inventory is better than none, the low tech route offers the least protection for you, unless you keep it stored off site. However, this becomes bothersome when you need to update your list, and could possibly cause your list to not be as accurate as it should be.



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Using a spreadsheet offers the flexibility to create just the Home Inventory YOU need, whether you use Microsoft Excel, Open Office Calc, or Google Docs Spreadsheet. The goal is to create whatever categories or variables you want to include in your inventory to properly catalogue your collection of valuables. It isn't as polished and pretty as some of the other home inventory tools in the higher tech category, but it certainly gets the job done. Once it is completed, it can be saved on a flash drive that you can carry with you, put on a CD that you leave at work or uploaded to a online account for easy access.

Division 4's no quarterly meeting scheduled at this time.



(Personal Protective Equipment) such as work gloves, goggles and dusk mask but also water, long term storage energy bars, duct tape, plastic sheeting for basic shelter, an AM/FM radio & whistle for communications, glow stick and flashlight for illumination.

Governor Cuomo was in attendance, and thanked the dignitaries for attending and for their tireless efforts after Super Storm Sandy and praised their continued support during the rebuilding process.

Due to changing weather patterns, NYS will be creating an advanced weather prediction center to get the best information, specific for our state, to direct resources as quickly as possible. Also, the state university system will be creating a College of Emergency Management, a first anywhere in the United States to offer a curriculum dedicated to the EM field.

New York has experienced more disasters in recent years than any other state and in response is building programs to combat these events and increase the resiliency of its residents. Building codes in low lying areas are being changed to require stilt construction where appropriate and funding to elevate key infrastructure. As fuel supplies were disrupted after both Irene and Sandy so a strategic petroleum reserve is being built to ensure gasoline, diesel and fuel oil will be available locally when supply lines are cut. Filling stations now require back-up generators along evacuation routes and certain down state filling stations will require the ability to hook up to generators should power be lost in the future.

This seminar went over the basic types of disasters that can occur (natural, man-made and technological) and discussed the planning process for an all hazards approach to resiliency.

Introductions were provided similar to the CERT segments on Firefighting (know the extinguisher types – A (paper/wood) – B liquids – C Electrical), how to turn off your utilities (natural gas, propane, fuel oil, electricity and water) when you leave your shelter or "Bug Out," and the process of documenting all possessions with pictures and video to prove their condition to insurance companies, among other topics.

Overall this training was a good introduction to the emergency response process but only scratched the surface. Our CERT training goes way beyond this limited 2 hour course and with the addition of advanced training reinforces our need to continue learning, practicing and spreading the word to family and friends that CERT is here to help all county residents prepare for the next event.

With hundreds of Long Islanders in attendance full of questions and concerns, it is obvious the need for this training and information is highly sought-after.

Please share the news of CERT with family, friends and coworkers and encourage them to sign up for our Basic Training, so they too can be best prepared for whatever comes our way.

# Home Inventory

Taking pictures or recording video of the contents of your home is an old and insuranceagent-recommended method of taking stock of your possessions. Armed with a digital camera or camcorder it's easy to shoot as many pictures or minutes of video as you need. Always take an extra few seconds to snap a picture or **zoom in on the serial numbers and the important details of your possessions**—flip a piece of china over to show the make, take a close up picture of a stamp or proof mark on an antique that shows the age and value, etc. Burn the pictures or video to a DVD and place in a secure off site location, such as a Safe Deposit Box and/or upload them to a secure account online to ensure you have access to them when you need them.

Finally for those CERTS who are the most tech savvy, using a Smartphone App is an easy, convenient way to catalogue all that is valuable in your home. Even if you have a good memory, it is hard to remember everything, and the insurance company will want more than just your word on what you had and its value. Using an App makes it simple to photograph, list and make notes on your most important items, if not everything. While each App does not have every feature one would want, it can be the most stress-free way to catalogue your home. Considering most Americans do not have a home inventory list this might be one of the easiest ways to create one. Plus there are many available for free, so there is no reason not to give it a try.



There are 2 ways you can choose to make your inventory - by room or by category i.e.: hobby, art, furniture etc.

- Your inventory should include celebration purchases like jewelry and art, as well as everyday leisure items such as televisions and guitars.
- Don't forget items you use rarely such as holiday decorations, sports equipment, tools, etc.
- Pull together copies of original sales receipts and/or appraisal documents. Also note model and serial numbers.
- Consider sharing a copy with trusted friends, relatives and your insurance provider.

No matter how you choose to do it, the important thing is to create a home inventory and update it when you make major purchases. An up-to-date home inventory will:

- Help you purchase the right amount and type of insurance.
- Make filing a claim as simple as possible.
- Substantiate financial losses for tax purposes or when applying for financial assistance.
