County Executive Suozzi Receives Rudin Center Award





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Investing In Our Infrastructure

On February 15, 2007, Nassau County Executive Thomas R. Suozzi received the Annual Leadership in Transportation Award from New York University Wagner Rudin Center for Transportation Policy and Management.

"We are thrilled to be presenting the Public Leader Award to County Executive Suozzi," said Rudin Center Director, Allison L. C. de Cerreño. "He very much deserves the recognition for all his good work and especially for his recent role with the New York Metropolitan Transportation Council. He helped them pull together the concept of shared regional goals in transportation."

"Transportation infrastructure affects our region's economy, environment and our quality of life. My administration is committed to working toward improving air quality, reducing congestion and supporting mass transit, including the Second Avenue subway, East Side access for the LIRR and connecting Nassau's HUB area to the region's transit system," stated County Executive Suozzi. "I am particularly honored to receive this award from the Rudin Center, which is a nationwide leader in developing innovative solutions to transportation issues."

The County Executive was recognized for his efforts in promoting an aggressive program to help address congestion and air quality issues in Nassau County; for supporting transit-oriented development as part of the County's Nassau Hub Major Investment Study development plan, as well as for his own visionary plan for New Suburbia. In 2005, while working with Long Island Transportation Management (LITM), the County introduced a series of programs targeted to County employees, in an effort to reduce single occupancy vehicles on Long Island's roadways.

These include: **TransitChek**, the Commuter Benefits Program to provide fiscal incentives to employees that commute to work using public transportation. **NuRide**, a private sector computer-based ridesharing program authorized for use by County employees. **GuaranteedRide Home**, as a complement to NuRide, assuring participants that they will always have a trans-

portation option in the event of unforeseen circumstances.

Nassau County has hosted Transit Fairs at various County sites to introduce these programs and to provide a general awareness of commute alternatives. LITM has named Nassau County a Commuter Choice Employer, and was given a 2006 Regional Commuter Choice Award by NYMTC.

The County Executive served as Co-Chairman of the New York Metropolitan Transportation Council from April 2005 to March 2006. (story continues on pg 4)

County Executive Appoints Committee to End Homelessness

On March 8, 2007, Nassau County Executive Thomas R. Suozzi introduced the members of the Nassau Committee to End Homelessness, which he appointed and charged with developing a 10-year plan to tackle chronic homelessness. The 30 member committee is made up of non-profit and faith-based service providers, government officials and three formerly homeless people.

The County has made great strides on this front. Since 2003, 617 homeless families formerly placed in shelters and motels, have moved into permanent housing, most with the assistance of federal housing vouchers, at no cost to the county. 1,605 individuals who called (866) WARMBED, the county's homeless hotline, were placed in shelters – 30% of those now receive services needed to lead healthy and productive lives.

"The County has been very aggressive and very successful in helping to prevent at-risk families and individuals from becoming chronically homeless," Suozzi said. "The Nassau Committee to End Homelessness will build upon these successes, and take this important

work to the next level – combating chronic homelessness."

The federal Housing and Urban Development agency presented the County with two checks, totaling more than \$7 million, to fund many vital homeless services. The Nassau Continuum of Care Group, an umbrella group of homeless service providers, received \$6.5 million, and the county received more than \$600,000 to fund emergency shelter. "HUD is de-

lighted that Nassau County, under the able leadership of Tom Suozzi, has joined with other communities across this country to address their homeless population," said Sean Moss, HUD Regional Director for New York and New Jersey.

"The committee represents a model of how the public and private sectors can work together to seek solutions to serious community and regional problems," said Committee Chair Marge Rogatz, of Community Advocates. The committee is expected to present its plan within 6 months.

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Envision a New Village of Hempstead Downtown

Nassau County Executive Thomas R. Suozzi and Village of Hempstead Mayor Wayne J. Hall, Sr. today announced a \$3 million investment initiative for the revitalization of Franklin Avenue in the Village of Hempstead's downtown.

"The Village of Hempstead has many assets: it is a major public transportation center with rail and bus terminals, it has a large downtown, and most importantly, it is centrally located. These improvements will reflect the pride of the residents of the Village of Hempstead and help spur economic activity. "said Suozzi.

"Improving the image and overall quality of life in the Village of Hempstead is not only critical to economic growth in the Village and the Hub at large, it also helps create the kind of community that we want our children - and their children - to grow up in," said Mayor Hall.

The plan calls for a new Franklin Avenue streetscape, including brick paver sidewalks, decorative street lights, benches, and trash cans. The \$3 million cost will be covered by funding from Nassau County's Capital Project. Construction is to begin in Spring 2008, following a series of public meetings. Nassau County has selected the firm of Urbitran Associates, Inc. to provide design services. As part the county's "Community Environment Improvement" project, a county-wide effort to beautify specific areas throughout Nassau County, the center median of Peninsula Boulevard from Franklin Avenue to

Five Businesses Receive Empire Zone Certification ~ 160 New Jobs

Nassau County Executive Tom Suozzi and Deputy County Executive Patrick Duggan announced in February that the Nassau County Empire Zone Certification Officer, jointly with the NY State Commissioner of Labor and the NY State Commissioner of Economic Development have certified that five business in Nassau County are eligible to access benefits within the boundaries of the Nassau County Empire Zone. The certification of these businesses will create almost 160 new jobs in Nassau County.

"These five businesses - all of which have agreed to create new jobs in the coming years - represent the promise of the new Empire Zones in Nassau County," said Nassau County Executive Tom Suozzi. The Empire Zone (EZ) Program offers significant tax incentives and utility reduction benefits to certified businesses located in or investing in a designated Empire Zone to encourage economic and community development, business investment and job creation. The five busi-

nesses that have been certified and eligible thus far for Empire Zone benefits are:

Cyrostar Industries, Inc. (New Cassel), a maintenance and repair service provider to the bio-medical industry in the Metro NY area for the past 13 years, has two divisions and is establishing a third in the Empire Zone. Cryostar plans to invest \$1.65 million in the purchase and renovation of another building and plans to invest an additional \$150,000 in machinery and equipment for the new facility. The company plans to create 8 additional Service Technician jobs, each making between \$50,000-\$100,000 in total wages and benefits. Cove Acquisition Corporation (Freeport), is a wire forming products manufacturer for commercial industry. Eightyseven new jobs are projected for the next 5 years in engineering, sales management and tool and dye maker jobs. Capital investment is estimated at \$3.8 million for the purchase of machinery and equipment and building renovations. Mini Graphics, Inc. (Freeport), a manufacturer of quality package inserts servicing the pharmaceuticals industry. The company plans a capital investment of over \$2,000,000 to expand its current operations and will create 50 new jobs to add to its current employment of 129. SJ Price. Inc. (Freeport), wholesales paper goods and restaurant supplies in a Main Street/ Urban Core area targeted for revitalization. This business plans an investment of \$100,000 to expand operations through building renovation and purchase of equipment. They will increase their employees by more than 20% (6 new jobs) over the next 5 years. Topel Realty LLC (Hempstead), is a sporting goods apparel retail establishment and real estate rental agency under one entity. According to Empire Zone law they are located in a "distressed" area, in a Main Street/Urban Core downtown area targeted for revitalization. The company plans to make a capital investment of \$910,000 to purchase and renovate a building for the 6 employees they will hire.

300 NEW JOBS IN HIGH SKILL HIGH TECH INDUSTRY ~BOSTWICK INDUSTRIES

Nassau County's Office of Economic Development is pleased to announce that Bostwick Laboratories, headquartered in Richmond, VA, is opening it's fifth location in the United States and the United Kingdom in Uniondale, NY. Bostwick is expanding its operations to Nassau County and creating over 300 new jobs. "I am pleased that Bostwick Laboratories has picked Nassau County to expand their business under the Empire Zones Program," said County Executive Tom Suozzi. "The Empire Zones Program furthers our goal

of attracting high-tech, high-skilled industries such as Bostwick Laboratories. "

"The company has applied for Empire Zone consideration as a Regionally Significant Bio-Technology Project with the Nassau County Empire Zones Program," stated Deputy County Executive for Economic Development Patrick Duggan.

In addition to new job creation, Bostwick Laboratories plans to invest \$14.8 million in the acquisition of a 70,000 square foot building on 5.5 acres at 100 Charles Lindbergh Boulevard in Uniondale. The types of positions created will include Executive, Pathologists, Administrative Staff and Laboratory Personnel, with salary ranges from \$26,000 to as high as \$500,000.

Bostwick Laboratories is a full service laboratory specializing in Urological Pathology and dedicated to the diagnosis, treatment and management of prostate cancer and all urologic conditions.

President Street will be upgraded. "Village of Hempstead gateway" signs welcoming visitors to downtown Hempstead from northern and southern approaches also will be incorporated into the project. The Village recently approved an estimated \$2 billion conceptual proposal from UrbanAmerica, which gives them the green light to begin the development process. Their proposal to revitalize a 3-square mile part of the village would include 2,800 units of housing, along with new retail space, and a performing arts center.

"The coordination between the County and the Village of Hempstead is an example of a partnership focused on achieving our goals for "New Suburbia" that includes revitalizing our downtowns," said Suozzi.
